CARDINAL VIRTUES IN WAR CHEST PLAN

Yesterday, The Observer mentioned the manner in which the War Chest plan, to be inaugurated and subscribed to in November, will stop the loss to the county in over-subscriptions. There is a second great reason why the War Chest should be adopted, for it stops loss in man power. Each year, under war conditions, there would be about 10 drives for war relief. For each one of these drives, in Union county, it requires 100 men and women who would otherwise be busy with their own businesses. These 500 work from one to four weeks on each drive, however small, and certainly would be worth an average of \$4 each day if paid wages—they are worth that to themselves. The total amount, therefore, to conduct one drive, costs approximately \$5,000 in time and energy, for in a time like this every man and woman is or should be busy. Multiply this by 10 and you have the annual cost of continuous drive plans. With this outright waste must be coupled the losses sustained by essential businesses that suffer because these 500 people are not at their usual stations. Is there anything practical, or expedient, about it? Why not let one annual drive do all this, and allow the virile patriotic men and women of Union county to apply fifty-one weeks of the year to their own businesses with the view of making more money, to buy more bonds and to give more liberally? It doesn't require a mathematician or a philosopher to detect that the loss is there, and a child can point the way to a sure cure—the War Chest plan.

The third great reason for a War Chest will be discussed in the next issue of this paper.

After this war is over, we predict that Germany will be the peace-lovingest nation on the face of the earth for a hundred years to come.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

Full Text of Wilson's Reply

(Continued from Page 1.)

has always been regarded as indirect violation of the rules and practices of civilized warfare. Cities and villages, if not destroyed, are being stripped of all they contain not only, but often of their very inhabitants. The nations associated against Germany cannot be expected to agree to a cessation of arms while acts of inhumanity, spoliation and desolation are being continued which they justly look upon with horror and with burning hearts. "It is necessary, also in order that there may be no possibility of misunderstanding that the President should very solemnly call the attention of the government of Germany to the language and plain intent of one of the terms of peace which the German government has not accepted. It is contained in the address of the President, delivered at Mount Vernon on the Fourth of July last.

"It is as follows: "The destruction of every arbitrary power anywhere that can separately, secretly and of its single choice disturb the peace of the world; or, if it cannot be presently destroyed, at least its reduction to virtual impotency."

"The power which has hitherto controlled the German nation is of the sort here described: it is within the choice of the German nation to alter it. The President's words just quoted naturally constitute a condition precedent to peace, if peace is to come by

the action of the German people themselves. The President feels bound to say that the whole process of peace will, in his judgment, depend upon the definiteness and the satisfactory character of the guarantees which can be given in this fundamental matter. It is indispensable that the governments associated against Germany should know beyond a peradventure with whom they are dealing.

"The President will make a separate reply to the royal and imperial government of Austria-Hungary. "Accept Sir, the renewed assurances of my high consideration. "(Signed) ROBERT LANSING." "Mr. Frederick Oederlin, Charge d'Affaires, ad interim, in charge of German interests in the United States."

RAILROAD LOAN IS SPEEDED UP

OUTLOOK SATISFACTORY, ACCORDING TO REPRESENTATIVE—ENDS 19TH.

That there will be no slackers in the fourth liberty loan drive among railroad employees is the consensus of opinion among officials and workers on this division. The outlook in the work is altogether satisfactory, according to recent announcements.

A. W. Perley, representative of the mechanical department of the O. W. R. & N., and Martin King, senator from Idaho in the early days of the state, will speak in Huntington today. Mr. King had charge of the railroad subscriptions at Kamela in the last campaign. Although that district had only been requested to raise \$350, over \$8,000 was actually subscribed.

At the present time approximately \$190,000 has been subscribed from all points on the second division.
