Seattle Advises All Not to Travel at Present Time.

A telegram to W. J. Church, chairman of the Home Service section of the Red Cross, states that on account of influenza and the risk attending all travelers, it has been deemed advisable to postpone the division conference on Home Service work from October 21 to December 9.

Mr. Church asks that all Red Cross workers who had contemplated attending the meeting at Seattle be guided by the telegram from the Seattle headquarters.

### DISTINGUISHED SERVICE.

Brother To Oliver Dasch At Hot Lake Honored.

The following from the Paris edition of the New York World is of interest to Union county people because the young man honored is a brother to Oliver Dasch, assistant manager at the Hot Lake Sanatorium:

"Private Carl W. Dasch, Headquarters Company, Infantry.—For extraordinary heroism northeast of Chateau Thierry, France, on July 26th to August 1st, 1918. Private Dasch during the entire period from July 26 to Aug. 1, 1918, carried messages between the firing line and battalion headquarters through heavy enemy shell fire. On returning from the firing line he would pick up a severely wounded man each time and carry him through the barrage to a first aid station. He finally became so exhausted he could not continue his work, yet he had to be ordered to the aid station for treatment. During the whole series of engagements he did not sleep, and taxed his physical endurance to the utmost, at all times setting to his comrades an example of utter disregard of danger and of exceptional devotion to duty.—(Next of kin, Mr. Fred. ## "HOOVERIZED" STORE BIGGER

LOCATES IN STEWARD BLOCK ON ADAMS AVENUE.

Increasing Business Demanded More Room And Central Location.

The Hooverized Grocery, which has been one of the healthy, going concerns in La Grande for some time, has leased a building in the Steward block next door to Hill's Department store, and things are being put in shape to serve the public. The proprietor, Sam Harris, has been a La Grande groceryman for several years and has built up a good business. When the government placed foodstuffs under federal regulation, Mr. Harris at once dropped everything to study carefully the government's requirements and plans. He could see that it was the wish of the department to transform many of the existing conditions into practically governmental agencies that they might function so as to make the work of Mr. Hoover, the food administrator, as easy as possible during the war. His study produced the Hooverized grocery, where he adheres strictly to government rules and regulations and endeavors to serve the people in a thoroughly impartial manner. His delivery system is approved by federal representatives for he charges only the cost of delivery to him. Any delivery, no matter of what size, is delivered for ten cents, which goes to the transfer man. This encourages people to order goods less frequently and does away with wagons and men which can be used in other war work.

"I feel good over the general co-operation given by the people of La Grande and Union county to the plans that I have worked out and put into practice. In a way they are new departures from the old system, but they are what the country needs at this time and the way the people have endorsed them proves to me that these plans should have been working for years. It is my hope to have one of the best stores in Oregon and every inch of it will be run along the approved plan of Herbert Hoover, food administrator. While the stock will be large and in fact it will be a regular market, where everything to eat may be had, it will hold to certain principles and no deviation whatever will be made. Mr. Stillwell will install a meat section in the new store so that every Hooverized customer can be served with everything his household needs in one order. Reduction of labor and at the same time furnishing the best to be had is the one great underlying principle. If I may be permitted, I would like to express my appreciation of the excellent volume of business that has been turned to me since the new idea of store-keeping and merchandizing was put into practice when I started the Hooverized store in La Grande."

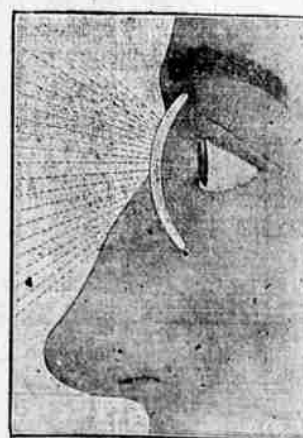
