"WIN THE WAR" ABOVE PARTY SPIRIT

GENERAL PERSHING ENDORSES WORK OF SOCIAL WELFARE.

(By Nolan Rice Best.)
PARIS, Oct. 2.—(By Mail)—The proudest thing to be said about and for the American Army in France from a moral standpoint is that its commanding general is just as anxious to see his soldiers maintain a clean, faithful standard of manly integrity as to see them come off victorious in battle. Not often has it been possible to say so much of any army and its leader—certainly never in any army

comparable in size and significance to the American Expeditionary Force now in France. But it is literally true concerning General Pershing, and his sentiments in this regard are not merely utilitarian. He knows right well, of course, as any thorough soldier must, that an army made up of men sound and strong in personal character is necessarily a more dependable army in a military sense than could ever be constituted from rogues and ruffians.

But his moral concern for his men goes deeper than that. It is out of his personal valuation of religious faith—his own experience of it—that General Pershing has set his heart on having every soldier under his command preserve in France whatever religious faith he brought from the homeland, all of it at full strength—and get more of it if he can.

This is the main spring of the encouragement which the commanding general has so constantly given to the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Welfare Board, and the Salvation Army. He wants his men under the influence of these religious forces. It is the secret also of his quite unexampled pains to develop the power and use of the chaplaincy among his troops. The reason why he insisted on creating the headquarters unheeded of office of "senior chaplain" of the army and on appointing to the position the man who had been his own most trusted spiritual counselor—Bishop Brent. No great soldier ever issued before to his troops any such moving religious appeal as that unofficial but mighty effective word of counsel, so wisely circulated by the Y. M. C. A., in which General Pershing, like an older brother to his soldiers, begs them to be true to the precepts of the Savior. And these public appeals confirm the reality of the conviction which an innocent revelation of headquarters secrets tells of his expressing to his staff: "Getterson, this army of ours has a heart and a conscience, and that heart and conscience must be fed." In that noble work is spoken the explanation of such that makes General Pershing unique among the military chiefs of his time.

To holders of 4 per cent bonds of the First Liberty Loan converted and 4 per cent bonds of the Second Liberty Loan:

The privilege of conversion which arose in consequence of the issue of 4 1/2 per cent bonds of the Third Liberty Loan will expire on November 9, and under existing law cannot be extended or renewed. Holders of these 4 per cent bonds lose nothing by exercising the privilege of conversion and gain one-fourth per cent interest per annum. Holders of 4 per cent bonds should not wait until the last moment to exercise the privilege of conversion, but proceed to do so promptly. Delay will result in over-burdening the banking institutions of the country and the Treasury Department by making it necessary to handle all conversions at the last moment, and may result in the loss of privilege of conversion altogether.

HELPS ATTACK ON ANIMAL DISEASE

GOVERNMENT TO PAY PART OF VALUE OF ANIMALS KILLED.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 15.—The 1919 agricultural appropriation bill just passed by Congress contains an item expected to be of great importance in the Federal and State campaign to eradicate tuberculosis among cattle and swine. It provides that the federal government shall pay indemnity to owners whose cattle are slaughtered because they have been found infected with tuberculosis.

The Department of Agriculture is to pay one-third of the difference between the appraised value of the cattle and salvage value of the slaughtered animals, provided that the state, county or municipality in which the cattle are owned and kept is co-operating in the tuberculosis work and pays at least an equal amount to the owner. In no case is the federal government to pay more to the owner than is paid by the state, county or municipality. No payment by the Federal government is to be more than \$25 for any grade animal or more than \$50 for any pure-bred animal, and no payment is to be made unless the owner has complied with all the quarantine regulations.

This provision is expected to remove much of the opposition among cattle owners that has hindered tuberculosis eradication work. Through it, the federal government, the state, county or municipal governments and the owners of cattle will share in the loss resulting from slaughtering infected animals for the protection of other animals not infected.

Accrediting Rules Adopted.
Another important development expected to hasten tuberculosis eradication was the unanimous adoption by breeders and live-stock sanitarians of national reputation of regulations for accrediting pure-bred herds of cattle.

This action, taken last December, marked the co-ordination of efforts of individuals and the state and federal governments for the suppression of tuberculosis in pure-bred animals.

On July 1, the department issued its first list of herds officially accredited as free from tuberculosis. The herds numbered on that date approximately 240. The list also named herds that had passed one successful annual test. They must pass another annual test successfully before being placed on the accredited list.

Annual Loss Is Big.
The annual loss from tuberculosis among cattle and hogs is reckoned at \$40,000,000 in the United States. The Federal campaign to eradicate the disease is of comparatively recent beginning. It has been divided into three well-defined projects. The first project is the eradication of tuberculosis from individual herds of pure-bred cattle; the second is the eradication of cattle tuberculosis from circumscribed areas; the third is the eradication of tuberculosis among swine.

It is estimated by officials in close touch with available records that 15 per cent of pure-bred cattle in this country are affected with tuberculosis. In grade cattle and swine the percentage of infection is gradually increasing, as shown by post mortem records in establishments where meat inspection is maintained. Infected animals are not only dangerous to other animals but may transmit the disease to mankind through milk and flesh.

ARTILLERY DIVISION AT FORT STEVENS

FORT STEVENS, Ore., Oct. 15.—Enlistment is now open to men who wish to fire high explosive shells across the Rhine.

Induction into the Coast Artillery, which is supplying the heavy artillery corps for overseas service, has been opened to men of certain qualifications.

Officers at the fort today gave out corrected data on induction. The service is open only to the following men: Candidates for officers (that is, men who appear to have the requisite qualifications, education or military experience or mature intelligence, or all); stenographers; radio operators; electricians; draughtsmen; automobile mechanics; cooks and bandmen.

All other men—the average men who fill up the rank and file—cannot be individually inducted. An application should be addressed to the Commanding Officer, Coast Defenses of the Columbia, Fort Stevens, Oregon.

The application must give the following information: Name in full; order number, if known; serial number; class (number and letter); color of hair; physical qualification (if known); present address; designation and street address of nearest local board (to be given only in case registrant is at a distance from local board of origin); date of registration (men of Class 1 registered prior to September 12, 1918, cannot be taken); trade or business; education (name of schools and number of years).

A candidate for officers training camp can be of almost any vocation provided he is otherwise acceptable.
