Automobiles of practically every make that are in fair condition will be at a premium in six months from now. This is the opinion of men high in automobile circles here and is based on several sound reasons.

New automobiles will be almost impossible to get after the first of the year, due to the fact that motor car factories will have curtailed their production in order to take care of war orders.

Very few concerns are now promising deliveries in advance of the next few months, as the future is decidedly uncertain. This very uncertainty, however, together with the fact that few automobiles will be manufactured, makes it certain that people owning motor cars will have a distinct financial asset.

"Used cars will be higher in price than ever before," asserts W. R. Delany, of the D. C. Warren Motor Car Co., Velle and Peoria car and truck distributors. "In my belief, used automobiles will be at a premium. Anyone buying an automobile is investing his money to good advantage, for all cars will be higher in price before they are lower again."

"At the present time cars are being overhauled by many concerns and sold from floors where formerly only new cars were marketed. This is the natural development of the car shortage, and is directly in line with what was done in London for some time after the war broke out. Factory experts are being secured to do the rebuilding work."

TROPICAL LIFE LURES IVANHOES

SOCIETY OF SAMOA CHARMS WIDELY-KNOWN LA GRANDE PEOPLE.

Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe has just received letters from her son, Forrest, and his wife, who write in glowing terms of the life of the Samoa Islands, where they are now living, signifying, as Mrs. Ivanhoe says, that the lure of the tropics is growing upon them. As many here have met Mrs. Ivanhoe, who may be remembered as Miss Maude Goodwin of Oakland, Calif., the following tribute from her husband may be of interest:

"Maude seems to be the hit of the island with her singing, and the American consul, who was here some time back from Apla (British Samoa) has requested the governor to send her over in a gunboat to sing 'Joan of Arc' and 'Over There' for a big Red Cross drive they are having in British Samoa."

Mrs. Ivanhoe, in her letter, adds this:

"Today the governor received a letter from Mr. Mitchell (American consul) requesting him to send the station band and me to assist in an American Red Cross Drive in Apla. From the way the governor speaks it looks as if we would go. Imagine sending one of Uncle Sam's gunboats on a special trip of three days to take us, Forrest will be given leave to go with us."

Among the wonderful experiences in the life on the islands, the following description is an example: "We went recently to the construction cabin, where a dam for the station water supply is being built. The navy civil engineer, who has charge of the work, invited us to go. It was most beautiful in the midst of the tropical jungle. We were above the banana and coconut palm altitude into the taller, sturdier trees, where the vines clung and twisted about the trunks, up to the tip-top branches and tendrils as thick as one's arm, hung down perhaps 50 feet. Also ferns that I could easily stand under."

"But the swimming pool was the joy of it all. I felt like a water nymph as I splashed about in that deep pool in a rock grotto—the sheer sides of which were spotted

D. W. CAMPBELL TO LEAVE VALLEY

HAS PURCHASED RANCH NEAR LEBANON — VALLEY LOSES GOOD MAN.

The Grande Ronde valley is losing one of its best citizens when W. D. Campbell, after giving the matter thorough consideration decided to sell his ranch seven miles north of Island City and remove to the Willamette valley.

Mr. Campbell came to the Grande Ronde about twelve years ago, and has been one of the substantial citizens of the valley ever since. That he was formerly of Kansas is no special recommendation, although it is not by any means a bad recommendation. His early years spent in the Sunflower state developed the work habit, for no one could live in that state during the years of Mr. Campbell's residence there without working. In those days it was not "work or fight," but it was "work or go hungry." Putting those early teachings into thorough practice he came to this valley, and developed a ranch that is a good one. His part in the public welfare of the valley has always been cast on the right side, and in leaving this section he leaves many friends who hope the Lebanon section will suit him and join in recommending him to the people of that portion of the Willamette.

Mr. Campbell will hold a public sale at his farm next Friday, at which time he will clean up considerable personal property, after which he will arrange to move to his new home.

Older Men Will Be Called to Serve Some Time in the Spring, Is Report

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 22.—Draft calls for men who have passed their 37th birthdays are expected to begin about March 1. The approximate date of the first call was disclosed yesterday by publication of testimony by Provost Marshal General Crowder before the House military committee.

General Crowder told the committee 2,399,000 newly registered men between 18 and 45 will be called before July 1. The calls for general service will be divided as follows: October, 245,000; November, 204,000; December, 197,000; January, 147,500; February, 147,500; March, April, May and June, 344,000 each month. These men will supply both the Army and the Navy and Marine Corps.

In addition 20,000 men for limited service will be called each month.

The United States and its allies have yet before them to follow out the prescription of force without stint or limit. And this will be followed until Germany has been brought to a full concession of ally and American demands.

Toledo Times.—The entente must realize that the German government still is the Hohenzollerns, with Dr. Solf as the mouthpiece. Wilson must answer this note, and we hope he will discard polite diplomatic language and use the harsh phrase "unconditional surrender."

Baltimore Sun.—The German government trusts that the president of the United States will approve of no demand which would be irreconcilable with the honor of the German people and with opening a way to a peace of justice. What grim humor? What hypocrisy! The German government knows that any peace reconcilable with the German sense of honor as it has disclosed itself during the last four years would be an atrocious one.

St. Louis City Journal.—The reply is a denial of facts already proven, a request for the acceptance of the unsupported word of a nation whose boast has been the breaking of its word, a claim that it is accomplishing now internal changes of government which it said in its preceding note already existed, and a plea for an armistice which does not stop the manufacture of munitions of war with which to resume the struggle when it chooses to withdraw from the agreement.

Birmingham (Ala.) Age Herald.—Germany need not hope to spin out a lengthy correspondence by conceding a point here and there. Quibbling will not gain the end she seeks.

Memphis Commercial Appeal.—The entire German conversation has been a waste of time and a diversion from the main theme.

Reino State Journal.—Germany's reply should preclude further negotiations for peace. The tenor of her terms indicates that she is not in a receptive mood at this time to accept the terms which our allies and ourselves will exact—unconditional surrender. These two words, cabled to Berlin, would place our case squarely before the autocrats of Potsdam.

Lincoln State Journal.—We believe peace has been brought appreciably nearer in the last 24 hours. Whether it is peace this fall or after another year of fighting will depend entirely upon the sincerity of the Germans. Fighting must go on with so wily and unscrupulous a foe until it is certain he can reap no advantage from an armistice.
