JOINS FORCES WITH WAR CHEST

TO SOLICIT FOR FUNDS DURING NOVEMBER CAMPAIGN

Local Institution Finds Need For Support From General Public—Taking Part In Work.

The War Board of Union county in charge of the War Chest campaign which comes on next month, and the Finance Committee of the local Y.M.C.A. have arranged for the annual financial campaign of the La Grande Y. M. C. A. to be carried on jointly with the War Chest Campaign.

To save duplication of effort on the part of collectors by making two separate drives, the collectors who go out on the War Chest drive November 11th to 18th will also carry subscription cards for the local Young Men's Christian Association.

During these war times, when so many of the young men of the community have gone into the service of their country the local association finds its regular income from membership dues very largely diminished and is faced with the necessity of getting its support more largely from the general public.

President Wilson says: "Keep the home base strong," save money, save food, save boys. The boys of La Grande and Union county are just as valuable as the boys of any other city or county in the land. Since the war began the tendency all over the country has been to more than double Y. M. C. A. work for boys and La Grande should not fall behind the procession.

Health Board Gives Warning of Influenza Danger
