VISITED SCENE OF MURDER

JURY INSPECTS LOCATION OF
LONELY HERMIT HOME

Judge Knowles Directs Verdict Of
Not Guilty For McFall—Jury
To Retire Today.

Arguments are being delivered this afternoon in Circuit Court in the case of The State versus Walter B. McFall and Ray C. McFerron, Perry boys, charged with the murder of William Moore, lonely hermit and miser, at Perry, last Thanksgiving.

John S. Hodgkin district attorney, represents the State and R. J. Green the defendants.

Judge Knowles this morning directed a verdict of not guilty as far as Walter B. McFall is concerned, holding that McFerron's alleged confession to Deway Potter in the county jail several months ago in no way implicated McFall, who was otherwise cleared. The jury will retire about the middle of the afternoon.

The case has attracted considerable attention, the arguments which are being delivered this afternoon especially drawing a great number of people.
