BOYS AND GIRLS HELP FILL CHEST

TO BE KNOWN OVER NATION AS "VICTORY BOYS AND GIRLS"

Each to Be Encouraged To Contribute Five Dollars of Own Savings

Every person in Union county will not be given an opportunity but will be solicited to subscribe to the war chest fund in the coming campaign.

From the \$87,000 raised during the campaign the war chest will meet all quotas asked by the seven organizations which will be represented in the present campaign. The organization will extend down to the youngest of young school youngsters. Each one will be known as a Victory Boy or Victory Girl and will be asked by the government to help supply Y. M. C. A. privileges and many other comforts such as the Y. W. C. A., the War Camp Community Service, Knights of Columbus, Jewish Welfare Association, American Library Association and Salvation Army have been rendering to the American army overseas.

Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, county school superintendent, is county chairman of the campaign among school children and Superintendent A. C. Hampton of the city schools has been appointed campaign manager. Mrs. Ivanhoe is confident that the work among the school children will be a great success, even though it is hampered somewhat by the fact that the schools are closed in many districts. She says: "With their usual ready response I am sure that the children will do as they have always done. It is only necessary to get the work started and they will take it up with enthusiasm. The great question is to reach them now that the schools are closed."

Under the direction of Superintendent Hampton letters are being mailed to all Union county teachers and the following plans are suggested for conducting the campaign in their district: The teacher in each school district in the county is asked to see that the boys and girls of her district are solicited. The boys and girls are to be urged by their teachers to give at least five dollars out of their earnings for the War Chest, but a less amount will be accepted.

The teachers are also urged to appoint a captain for Victory Boys and Girls in her district, and see that the captains appoint committee for soliciting the boys and girls in the district. The names of boys and girls with the amount subscribed by each are to be kept separate so that we can determine when the campaign is finished which has contributed the greater amount. The names of all boys and girls together with the amounts contributed by each are to be sent to Mr. A. C. Hampton, La Grande, Oregon, as soon as the campaign is finished. The money subscribed by the boys and girls is to be collected by the teacher which is to be turned over by her to the campaign manager of the local war board district in which the school happens to be located.

UNION COUNTY TO HAVE HELP OF "VICTORY GIRLS"

Through the patriotic sacrifices of 1,000,000 American girls, additional proof is being given every American soldier that he has the solid backing of a united nation.

The girls of America are all becoming "Victory Girls." They are making the war their war and they are doing their personal "bit" to bring it to an early conclusion.

"Victory Girls" are girls who have pledged themselves to "earn and give" at least \$5 to the United War Work Campaign, through which seven organizations will raise \$170,500,000 during the week of November 11-15. Every day marks the enrollment of thousands of additional "Victory Girls." Under the plan announced by leaders of the gigantic campaign for war work funds the "Victory Girl" army will be an army 1,000,000 strong. No American girl is barred from enlistment. Enrollment in the mighty force may be accomplished by the giving of a pledge to "earn and give" at least \$5 toward the comfort and cheer of the fighting brother.

The western department of the "Victory Girls" army, to be organized in the states of California, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho and Montana, will be made up of 45,000 girls. Every western girl is to become a "Victory Girl." Every western girl will accept the nation's challenge for patriotic service and contribution directly to the winning of the war.

THREE POINTS IN THE WAR CHEST.

No. 1.—Last year Union county was called on for about \$40,000 and subscribed \$76,000. This is about \$36,000 more than was asked for. Why not conserve your dollars for future calls?

No. 2.—By making one campaign a year, the work can be made thorough and complete; therefore all the people in the county can be reached; your neighbor will pay his share just like you do. This distributes the load.

No. 3.—In order to put on a campaign in this county, it requires 300 people working an average of five days each, or a total of 1500 days. This time is donated. If they were working at pay rate, each would average \$5.00 per day, on an average, or \$7500 in earning power, which is donated at each drive. In the past, there has been an average of 10 drives per year, which would amount approximately to \$75,000 in earning power that has been donated. The war chest plan will handle this entire year's work for about seventy thousand less, in earning power donated.

the part of each individual of 10 per cent of the amount to which he was asked to subscribe to in bonds. The sum will be deposited in the county war chest and as separate drives—as that for the Red Cross at Christmas, are launched. The only way in which Union county's plan differs from that of other counties in that it is more far reaching in its operations and relies to a greater extent, the individual from subscribing to many different funds. Union county people will not be obligated to contribute to war relief society funds until next year.

Seven Organizations Represented This drive is to raise a national fund of \$170,500,000 for the seven organizations which are doing relief work among the soldiers. These organizations are: the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the War Camp Community Service, Jewish Welfare Board, Knights of Columbus, Salvation Army and American Library Association.

Peace Talk Has No Place The organization will not allow any peace talk to interfere with the campaign. Even though peace were declared now, a period of about a year would be required for demobilization according to the opinions of authorities. The same methods will be employed in this as in past campaigns and the Advisory Board will insist upon each potential contributor giving to the best of his or her ability.

LABOR CENSUS TO BE TAKEN

LABOR BOARD TO CLASSIFY ALL WORKERS IN UNION AND WALLAWA COUNTIES.

At a meeting of the Community Labor Board, held last evening, plans were made for the taking of a labor census in the territory under the jurisdiction of this board, which covers all of Union and Wallawa counties.

The nature of this census will be the listing of all labor, showing the name, the exact occupation, the experience at such, the age, wages, nationality, and other information necessary to properly classify every employe, both male and female in the two counties. The blanks for the taking of this census will be sent to every employer of labor, within a short time, but it perhaps will take some several weeks to finish the work and card index all of the data. The object of this census will be to classify labor in respect to essential and non-essential occupations.

The appointment of a permanent secretary for the board was also made and the matter of the selection of two women as members of the board, one to represent the employers and one the employees, was referred to the next meeting.

declaration of war was needed. They supported it when there was a demand for the draft. They supported it when we sent the army overseas. They supported every demand for money, whether by taxation or by loan.
