SOLDIERS OUTSIDE OF THE STATE ARE VOTELESS

SALEM, Oct. 31.—Replying to a request from the commander of the Third naval district, which has headquarters in New York, to make arrangements whereby a number of Oregon men in active service in that district might cast their vote at the general election next week, Secretary of State Olcott points out that section 17 of article 2 of the state constitution limits the right of suffrage to citizens who are within the borders of the state on election day. Therefore Oregon men in military service, who are away from the state on election day will not be privileged to vote.

Commission Undertakes Settlement Salem—Professor H. D. Scudder will go to Washington early in November to represent the Oregon Land Settlement association and confer with the Secretary of Agriculture and the Secretary of the Interior regarding the part this state may take in the care of returning soldiers.
