great appropriation had been disbursed and up to October 1, the expenditure had reached about \$140,000,000.

Contracts let, however, committed about \$470,000,000 of the fund. The figures are given in answer to the general charge that the sum had all been expended with practically no results.

The attorney general concludes in his letter of transmittal that "no such profits have been allowed as to justify a charge of bad faith."

Recommends Court Martial

Col. E. A. Deeds, about whom raged most of the charges which brought on the investigation, the report recommends, should be brought before a court martial for sending confidential war department information on the aircraft situation to former business associates in Dayton, Ohio, and for being sponsor last February for a "grossly misleading statement" to the effect that "first American-bulld battleplane are today en route to the front in France."

Criminal prosecution of three army officers are recommended on the ground they transacted business with corporations in which they were financially interested. Those officers are: Lieut. Col. J. G. Vincent, former vice-president of the Packard Motor Car company, now in charge of the airplane engineering division of the aircraft production bureau; Lieut. Col. George W. Mixer, a stockholder in the Curtiss Airplane and Motor corporation, production manager of the aircraft bureau, and Second Lieut. Samuel B. Vrooman, Jr., inspector of propeller lumber and stockholder in the S. B. Vrooman company of Philadelphia, which sold mahogany to the government for airplanes.

Mr. Hughes concluded his report with the statement that "it is not within the province of this report to make recommendations with respect to administrative policy, but it should be said that under the direction of Mr. Ryan and Mr. Potter there has been improvement in organization and progress has been made in gratifying measure." William C. Potter, to whom Mr. Hughes referred, is assistant director of aircraft production.

A Greater Religion Is a Result of the War

In a certain city dwelt three men. And by accident of birth one of them is a Catholic and one is a Protestant and one is a Jew. For thirty years they have engaged in business side by side and the Catholic has not dealt with the Protestant, and the Catholic and the Protestant have no dealing with the Jew.

"What is he to me?" each man has said. "He is not of my faith. I will avoid him."

So for thirty years they have dwelt together, strangers in a friendly world.

Then came the shadow of a fearful war. And out of those three homes three boys went forth alone. Three fathers waited heart-worn for the letters from over there.

"There are soldiers of friendliness over here," the boys wrote home. "They bring us chocolate, and motion pictures, and baseball, and good lectures, and the memory of mother and of God."

"Help those friendly agencies when you have the chance," each boy wrote home.

So it happened that the three fathers found themselves working shoulder to shoulder in a great campaign for funds.

Not as a Catholic and a Protestant and a Jew—but as good citizens united in a common cause.

And as they worked they came to know each other, and they were ashamed that for so many years they had been strangers side by side.

"Surely this is one of the compensations of war," they said, "that in our deeper love for our boys we have learned a new respect for one another."

So a new spirit was born into that city. As though in its heart it had discovered something of the greater religion, whose God is Father, and whose faith and creed are love.

In this German internment camp in Western Canada, are 400 men, women and children, anti-American, and mostly anti-Christian. One young German told the secretary, "The Y. M. C. A. is the only argument in favor of Christianity I have seen since the war began," and another said, "The two hours of motion pictures which the Association furnishes makes me forget for the time that I am in this camp." The Associations are giving these men a full Association program, and use a staff made up from the prisoners. Strange to say the non-conformist English pastors from outside have the largest hearing. On account of the courtesy shown in Canada and America larger comforts and privileges have been made possible to the American and Allied prisoners in Germany.
