DEFEND THE PRESIDENT VIGOROUSLY

(Continued from Page One)

assertion is false, as the record shows that these acts were drafted by the Democrats with the aid of Republicans, all working together, and that they were approved before being passed by the administration. Certain Democrats and certain Republicans fought these measures, not however from any unpatriotic motives, but from motives of policy. Why not tell the truth about it? That "As a minority party, the Republicans forced upon a reluctant President . . . the amended draft act," is as malicious as it is false and untrue. The statement that the President has indicated a willingness to make peace by negotiation, is not supported by any act or word of the President. It is true that in his exchange of notes with Germany there was more or less concern among the people that he might concede her a peace made around a council table, "instead of sentence from court," but that concern was created by the minority in congress led by Senator Lodge, in unwarranted and unfounded criticisms of the President. The pretense that Taft and Roosevelt approach this subject as Americans only, is a sham as transparent as day. They approach it as partisans only. The charge that the President has drawn party lines strictly, from the first, in the prosecution of the war is so blatantly false as to deceive no one. In mobilizing the man power and material resources of the country for the purposes of the war he has appointed

to offices of trust and confidence hundreds and thousands of the most prominent Republicans of the country. Hughes, Root, Schwab, Ryan, Hoover, Garfield and Aitchison, are only a few of his Republican appointments to nation-wide duties. In this state we may name Ayer, Houser, Wilcox, Newell, Wentworth, McCourt, Burdard, Corbett, Griffith, Carey and Melschn. All of these men are rock-ribbed, dyed in the wool Republicans, appointed by the President to aid him in the prosecution of the war. Even in our own county and city most of the officers appointed to war work offices are republicans.

We must not forget that but for the financial legislation and the legislation which has enabled the President to mobilize in support of the war, the capital and labor of the country, which the President almost forced congress to enact, this war could not have been financed, and labor and capital alike brought to its support as they have been. Neither must we, the fathers, mothers, brothers and sisters of the boys at the front forget what the President has done and is still doing for those boys for their protection, comfort, health and well being. They were not sent to the front until they were thoroughly well-drilled and equipped to meet the conditions of modern warfare. They are supported there by every ounce of energy of the President backed up by the American people. They are fed and clothed better than any army was ever fed and clothed. They do not have to subsist upon embalmed, poisoned beef, as our boys did in the war with Spain under a Republican administration. They have not died by the hundreds and thousands of our boys did in the war with Spain, on account of the unsanitary conditions of their concentration

FOURTEEN HUNDRED PRISONERS.

PARIS, Nov. 2.—(By United Press.)—The Franco-American attack on the Aisne front, which is being developed in conjunction with the American drive west of the Meuse was resumed this morning, the war office announced, and fourteen hundred additional prisoners were taken.

FOUR THOUSAND HUNS GRABBED.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—(By United Press.)—Field Marshal Haig said today the British hold Valenciennes in its entirety. The city was taken this morning after hard fighting. Four thousand additional prisoners were taken. The battle continued on a six-mile front below the city until this morning.

YANKS TAKE MORE VILLAGES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(By United Press.)—General Pershing has announced the capture of nine villages on the Verdun front by the American army. The attack is being continued, with the assistance of French forces.

ITALIANS TAKE PRISONERS.

ROME, Nov. 2.—(By United Press.)—The war office announced today that Italian forces have practically cleared the Asiago Plateau, capturing many important peaks. Three thousand additional prisoners have been taken.

PATROLS CONTINUE FORWARD.

MILAN, Nov. 2.—(By United Press.)—Italian patrols have reached the Tagliamento river, say battle front dispatches.
