A BOON TO SOLDIERS

Red Cross Canteen Service Rendered at Troop Trains

Just how much is the Red Cross canteen service worth? This is a question that is agitating the Red Cross organization more or less.

How much is this worth? To hear the soldiers talk about it, the service can hardly be measured.

How does this work of the Red Cross compare in value with providing the necessities of clothing and medical supplies? It lifts them up, warms their hearts and raises their spirits, because, near the last moment, it gives them a glimpse of what is nearest and dearest among these possessions and ideals for which they are going forth to offer their lives.

There is no discount on this work. In a physical sense it is not necessary, because the boys would go through with out it. They do not need the hot coffee and sandwich which are inseparably connected with women's service.

SOLDIERS TO TRAVEL LIGHT Troops Will Carry No Ammunition in Trip Overseas.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—American soldiers will hereafter carry no ammunition with them when they sail overseas.

The War Department announced today that all ammunition except the allowances carried by officers will be shipped in bulk, to enable the fighting men to "travel light."

LAST CHANCE TO GET NEW BONDS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Owners of first Liberty bonds converted and second Liberty bonds, bearing 4 per cent, who wish to exchange them for bonds bearing 4 1-4 per cent must do so before Saturday, November 9, when the conversion privileges by law expires. This can be done without cost at any bank and the only effect is to give the bondholder an extra quarter of a per cent interest, which amounts to 25 cents a year on each \$100 bond. Third loan bonds are not to be converted because they already bear 4 1-4 per cent.

Yanks Continue Advance on Meuse--French Push on

LONDON, Nov. 6.—(By United Press)—Americans are continuing their advance in the Meuse region and have cleared the east bank northward to Milly, passing beyond Storme less than nine miles below Sedan, said the American communique today. The French, after maintaining contact with the German rear guards all night long, renewed their attack on the whole front this morning. An additional three-mile advance has been made at several points.

House of Representatives Safely Republican, Although Democratic National Committee Refuse to Accede the Defeat of Democratic Members

Henry Ford Is Beaten In Michigan—Kentucky Remains Doubtful and Is Claimed By Both Parties—Senator Weeks Defeated.—Union County Seems to Give Senator Pierce Lead Over Governor Withycombe, From Returns Available, While McNary Leads West By Probably More Than Two Hundred.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(By United Press.)—Republicans at a late hour this afternoon claimed the election of a Republican House and a Republican Senate, with fifty-one Republican and forty-five Democratic senators. It also claimed control of the House by twenty-nine.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(By United Press.)—With Republican and Democratic headquarters both claiming the House and the Senate, the United Press election figures this afternoon indicated the Senate result is in doubt and that the House of Representatives will be Republican.

The race for the Senate control is so close it may result in a tie, each party having the same number of votes, leaving Vice-President Marshall as presiding officer to cast the deciding vote on all questions wherein party lines are drawn.

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
