WITH THE COLORS

Stella M. Newbell formerly a popular nurse in the Grande Ronde hospital is now at the base hospital at Dartford, England. She writes to home folks as follows: "We twelve who were doing temporary duty in the other camp were called back to our unit about two weeks ago. We are now at Dartford, about sixteen miles from London. We have about 800 patients now and big bunches coming in almost every day. They

are wonderful boys to take care of and I enjoy my work so much. I am working in one of the wards now instead of giving anaesthetics and I enjoy it much more, for I love to tuck them up in bed and make them comfortable.

"It is very convenient for us to go in to London. I have been in four times and it sure seems good to go into a big city once more and enjoy the crowds, shows and all places of interest. I visited 'the Strand', 'Trafalgar Square' and 'Piccadilly' as well as Buckingham palace, the parliament houses and Westminster abbey. Of course we saw the Thames river and many other interesting things.

Among interesting anecdotes of the war as seen by representatives from Union county are those from Rev. G. L. Clark which tell of his work as a Y. M. C. A. Regional director in France. In a recent letter he writes as follows:

"My running mate and I made a trip yesterday to the field farthest away from my present headquarters. We started about ten o'clock and after a very roundabout way past the place where I headquartersed recently, we reached the town of M— at about 6:30. Finding the secretary, the first thing he said was that I was to preach to the boys at 7:30. So after finding a room in the hotel I went to the Protestant chapel and we had a fine time—that is, I did. A lovely French girl about 20 years old played and a soldier boy assisted her. The service was in a big stone church. We had to have candles only for there must be no bright lights. After the meeting, I think every boy there came up to shake hands with me. We left there this morning about 9:00 o'clock. I drove the car the greater part of the way home. Goodwin said that a time or two I made a movie auto 'look like two cents' the way I got around corners and passed folks on the way. But I got there and hit so one.

"I received a fine long letter from Dr. J. E. Ingie. He is very keen about finding Tubby and having Tub take his leave by visiting. He is well. I have to run into headquarters tomorrow night and will be in Paris two or three days. Hope to see Mrs. Morrison while there."

Rev. Clark tells of an associate in his Y. M. C. A. work who will soon return to the United States and says further:

"It was Brother Whitehouse who walked in over the berls one afternoon in an old church badly shot up by the Boche in the Chateau-Thierry region. Passing in the aisle two bodies of American soldiers prepared for burial he sat down to the old organ and played softly the old hymns just to feed his hungry soul in that way. Soon a soldier dropped in and quietly sat with bowed head and prayed.
