The Committee on Public Information, (Appointed by the President.)

This great war has presented to the world two great crises. The first crisis was when the war was declared. The destruction of the old order of things then began. The business of the world was stagnated, and after taking its bearings, it raced off in the direction of annihilation and war work. The second great crisis was when the armistice was signed. Again we will witness the stagnation of business affairs. We look around to see that old business relations have been destroyed, that old social distinctions have disappeared. We are turned loose upon the sea of "the power of the people." Our ship of state must be navigated so as to avoid the shoals of anarchy and at the same time ride upon the crest of the wave of democracy.

What a thrill it must have been to our boys in France when the motorcycle couriers flew over the country from column to column, announcing, "It's over all over boys! Liberty, justice, humanity, civilization itself, were involved in the issues of the battle of Chateau Thierry, whose fourteen thousand American heroes turned back the German hordes. What was the impression our boys made upon the French? An old white-haired woman in a little town in France that had known the German gun was standing on her door when an American Red Cross nurse went by. The old woman called out, "O, Madame! See them! Isn't it wonderful? Just look at them! All day like that, all night like that. Are there any people left in America? And see all your people so big, so fine! Scarcely four months has passed since Chateau Thierry and the energy and will of the American army having pervaded the whole Allied force, have brought the final victory. Is it any wonder that our stalwart youths are so greatly admired by the French people?"

What did the Germans think of our army? Captured official documents taken in the St. Mihiel drive contained a report from a

German officer to headquarters, which said that the American soldier is a great individual fighter; possessed of courage, prowess and energy to an extraordinary extent; has not been trained in the art of war and therefore, at times unnecessarily exposed himself; at all times fights to the last and refuses to surrender; "due, no doubt, to stories of German cruelty to prisoners." How little could this German officer read the American character!

Two things will make the American fight quicker than anything else—his home, and the one he loves best. It is the business of the organizations for whom the present drive is being made to keep our boys in touch with just those things. One of our own boys wrote a characteristic letter to his mother, which was printed in the Observer several days ago, wherein he said: "You are getting an additional letter this week, mother, because I stepped into a hut and saw a framed picture of General Pershing and underneath it said, 'Welcome. Have you written that letter to mother today?' So I got the writing materials, and here is the letter." Can there be anything more appealing for us to give to the support of this work?

We have hundreds of girls over in France, engaged in hut and canteen work, not only in the Red Cross and Salvation Army, but also in all the other organizations. When a soldier yells to his comrades, "Hey, boys, here's a girl who talks United States!" or exclaims, "Great Scott!" it's good to talk to an American woman. We know there is need for all the work that these allied organizations can do. Even though victory is won, there is necessity for reconstruction, and all the money that we can also will be a God-send to our people over there. So let's go over the top on this drive and give with the free will which is characteristic of Americans.
