DESILET HOME FROM THE CAMP

SAYS ALL MEN AT CAMP PIKE TO BE DISCHARGED SOON

Pat Foley and Lot Snodgrass Due to Return at an Early Date.

Norman Desilet arrived home this morning from Camp Pike where he was mustered out of service with the signing of the Armistice. He says the number of men now leaving the camp is very large and that all men who were not in thirty days before the order came to demobilize were immediately sent home. He was among this number.

Pat Foley and Lot Snodgrass have been there longer than thirty days and while they will be later in arriving in La Grande Mr. Desilet thinks it will be but a short time until all the boys at Camp Pike will be back.

He says both Pat and Lot had been doing great work there until the peace news came and then it was hard for any one to up courage to even make a first class drill.

Although citizens of Little Rock heard of the signing of the armistice early Monday morning no news was issued from Camp headquarters until orders were given to suspend examinations and discharge all who had not completed their course of training there. The town of Little Rock was literally given over to rejoicing when the news of peace arrived, says Mr. Desilet. Traffic was blocked, all street cars stopped until it was necessary to call special auxiliary police on duty.

"The weather down there is something great," says the returned soldier. The nights are cool and the days are pleasantly warm. But compared with Oregon—well, we have her beat a long way.

Mr. Desilet relates a number of amusing anecdotes of the colored troops, of which there are two companies training at the camps. Of course the order of the day was to "keep their chins off the ground." "It's one of the funniest sights I have ever seen to see that long line of shining, upturned faces," says Mr. Desilet.
