### THE "UNBELIEVER"

The United States Marine Corps recently collaborated with Thomas A. Edison and George Kleine in producing what is said to be the greatest moving picture of the war, and this feature is to have its first presentation in this city at the Arcade theatre, starting Wednesday.

"The Unbeliever" is a motion picture that carries a message to America which teaches a lesson, as did "The Birth of a Nation." It is something unique in film production in that it was taken through the active co-operation of a branch of the United States Marines; the Marine Corps. Marine officers and men take part in the presentation of the play. The picture breathes the fervor of intense loyalty, and tells a story that is in itself a powerful sermon.

"The Unbeliever" is the story of

a woman who finds his faith in the smoke and din of battle. Phil Landcutt, a young American aristocrat who has little faith in God, humanity or brotherhood of man, joins the marines, and once "over there" finds his unbelief is but shadows, and God, humanity and brotherhood are real. Thrilling trench warfare, bombardments of Belgian towns, charges, hand-to-hand conflicts, outpost duty and artillery duels are shown in startling realism, while the slaying of women and children by the Prussians stirs the spectators to fighting enthusiasm.

## "Y" STILL NEEDS MEN OVERSEAS

PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT ISSUES CALL FOR 5000 MORE WORKERS.

Need For French And Italian Army Work Greater Than in War Times.

J. L. Cramer, general secretary of the local Y. M. C. A. has just received the following telegram from the head of the Personnel Department in New York City:

1. Men thirty-seven or older September twelfth may be approved for overseas and secure passport without draft classification or permit to leave country.

2. Men thirty-two to thirty-seven in deferred classifications may now be recruited, but need permit to leave country. This means that there is no restriction in the classification for men over thirty-seven years of age, but men thirty-two to thirty-seven may be recruited who are in deferred classification only.

This cable also just received from New York: "Recent cable urges immediate sending forty additional men for French army. Needs for French and Italian army greater rather than less in coming period. The personnel there is insufficient to care for these needs even if the size of armies be greatly reduced by partial demobilization. Do all possible to secure suitable recruits."

It is imperative that 5000 men be secured for work overseas just as soon as possible and the duty rests upon every community to furnish its quota. Come to the Y. M. C.
