State Department Knows Nothing of the Yarns That Were Started.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 19.—President Wilson has informed Germany through neutrals that unless Germany maintains internal order hostilities will be resumed immediately, according to Berlin dispatches received here.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The state department announced this afternoon that there was not a word of truth in the statement that Wilson had notified Germany hostilities would resume if order was not maintained in Germany. It is believed the Stockholm reports have arisen as the result of the president's note to Germany stating that food would be furnished the Germans if order is restored. When Germany is intentionally garbing the President's message is not known but this is the second report of this nature that has been sprung from Berlin.

WHEAT PRICE TO
STAND AT \$2.20

SUPPLY THROUGHOUT WORLD IS SCARCELY AMPLE

The Entire 1919 Wheat Crop is Assured the Contract Price.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Wheat farmers of the United States will not receive less than \$2.20 a bushel for the 1919 crop. The president's proclamation to that effect and is a law that cannot be abrogated.

A commission will be appointed, as provided in the proclamation, to fix the exact price, but it will not fall below the amount named. This in the face of great quantities of wheat released in the Argentine, Australia and New Zealand.

It will take all this wheat and the European stores, if any, to feed the starving millions of the old world, and any surplus that this country can contribute will also be used, and even then short ration must prevail.

Argentina, Australia and New Zealand wheat will cost almost as much as American wheat laid down in the ware house of Europe.

In all probability the government will lose no money on the transaction, for the millers will probably have to pay the price, and the consumer will get much cheaper flour until after reserves have been established abroad by the harvesting of new crops over there.

In any event, the United States grain corporation, the purchasing agent of the food administration, and the allies, will take the entire 1919 crop, and if there is any loss of any kind the corporation will absorb it, and in the last analysis the taxpayers will foot the bill.

Substitutes for mixing white wheat flour have proved quite as expensive as wheat flour, and while they have been abandoned, this fact will not reduce the price of flour.

CONFERENCE WILL DECIDE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Disposition of the German battle craft ordered delivered to the Allies, will be left to the peace conference, the navy department said today. This information disposes of the impression that a division of the spoils of war had already been decided upon. Disposition of the American naval vessels now abroad was not determined. Relaxation of the guard line will not be possible just as German warships are dismantled or interned.

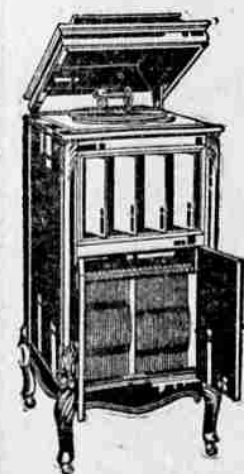
