GERMAN CASUALTIES

Total Is Placed by Vorwarts at Over Six Millions.

COPENHAGEN (Nov. 20.—The total German war casualties is 6,070,000, according to the Berlin Vorwarts. This includes 1,500,000 killed; 4,000,000 wounded and 400,000 taken prisoners.

"UNBELIEVER" AT ARCADE

One of the most intense films ever shown in La Grande is on view at the Arcade theater today, under the title of "The Unbeliever" by George Kleine.

Aside from its lefty patriotic motive, its great lessons, it is startlingly realistic scenic effects, the thrill of the story itself makes for an entertainment that holds the spectator in breathless absorption. It has been capped by few productions, regardless of the amount spent upon them. The war department "loaned" many hundred members of the Marine Corps to carry out the effects the story demands, and as a result the military scenes are done with an exactness and convincing snap that gives a grimly perfect setting for this tragic but inspiring glimpse into the horrors of "No Man's Land."

The film tells the story of a young American aviator, who has little faith in God, humanity or the brotherhood of man. He joins the Marines and once "over there," he finds his unbeliefs are but shadows and that God, humanity, and brotherhood are real.

WILL GIVE UP WAR VESSELS

THIS WEEK MARKS THE BIG SURRENDER OF ALL WARS.

German Fleet to Be Held by the Allies for all Future Time.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—This week will see the greatest naval surrender which the world has ever witnessed.

A great fleet of German battleships, battle cruisers and light cruisers and destroyers, left port Monday morning at 5 o'clock for an unknown destination. They will be met by the British fleet, accompanied by American and French representatives and conducted to their destination.

A Berlin telegram received in Amsterdam gives this list of the vessels to be handed over:

Battleships—Kaiser, Kaiserin, Konig, Albert, Krompauz Wilhelm, Prinz Regent Luitpold, Markgraf, Grosser Kurfurst, Bayern, Konig and Friedrich Der Grosse. Battle cruisers—Hindenburg, Derflinger, Seydlitz, Moltke and Von Der Tann. Light cruisers—Bremen, Brunner Frankfort, Koeln, Dresden and Emden.

The German cruiser Dresden was sunk off Falkland Islands by the British under Admiral Sturdee, while the Emden was sunk in the

Indian Ocean after it had raided shipping in the far east. It is probable that old ships had been given the names of the ships sunk, or that new ships have been built to replace them.
