BLOKLAND RANCH MAKES SHIPMENT

TWENTY HEAD OF HEREFORD YEARLINGS BRING \$6,500

Through a number of years of successful breeding, the Andrew Blokland cattle ranch has won fame and fortune throughout the state as well as county by the high grade of Hereford cattle raised there. A fact which redounds to the credit of the farm is the large number of repeat orders. One of these was shipped out this week when twenty head of yearling bulls sold to the Chemungus Cattle Growers Association of Wallowa county. A further proof of the satisfaction cattle from this ranch have been giving is the six thousand five hundred dollars which is represented in the transaction and which is the largest sum paid for the same number of head of stock ever shipped out of Union county.

Paul H. Spillman, county agricultural agent, watches with interest the rapid upbuilding of the cattle industry in this county and says in regard to the recent transaction:

"I have always maintained that it is best to grow good stock and if you are in the cattle business to use the best stock that you can buy. Two years ago Mr. Blokland paid one thousand dollars for a bull calf—a sum which at that time was considered a rather 'long' price for a calf. I am not so sure but that there are a number of people who would yet consider it so. But as evidence of the good investment, many yearlings are now being sold from the same ranch. It has been by such policy as this that the cattle of this and Wallowa counties have been built up to their general high standard. I believe that the high grade of the Blokland herds have been largely responsible for the improvement of Wallowa county cattle, for practically all breeders there secure their blooded stock here."
