CABLE LINES OPEN TO PUBLIC AGAIN

REOPEN AFTER FOUR DAYS
DURING WHICH LINES
WERE CLOSED

After a period of four days dur-
ing which all private communica-
tions were refused on inter-ocean
cable lines, friends and relatives
in America may once again send
greetings and congratulations to the
men of the victorious army across
the water. On November 18., all
telegraph offices were instructed by
Secretary Burleson to refuse any
and all cablegrams, in view of the
fact that cable lines must be held
open for the unusual amount of
government business at that time.
As a result of this order no less
than 100 persons were disappoint-
ed in getting their message through
immediately after the signing of
the armistice had been made pub-
lic, said Mr. Devins, manager of
the local Western Union office. The
annulling order which was made
public this morning at about 9:00
o'clock has resulted in another
rush of trade that threatens to
swamp for a short period, the car-
rying capacity of the lines.

without braving the dangers of
German U-boats, it is only neces-
sary to visit Sherry theatre, where
is being shown a masterly pluri-
tization of LES MISERABLES, the

of the immortal "Jean Valjean."

In LES MISERABLES William
Fox has left nothing undone to
have it historically correct, even
to the smallest details. A cross-
section of the streets of Paris,
made from photographs and draw-
ings and descriptions, was built
"somewhere in New Jersey" for
the making of LES MISERABLES.

As an instance of the minute-
ness of detail and realism insisted
by Mr. Fox and Director Frank
Lloyd in this most wonderful of
photodramas, the actual money of
France during 1810 and 1830 was
used. Victor Hugo's story called
for eight 20-franc gold pieces and
nine 1-franc silver pieces. These
coins are exceedingly rare and
valuable and were rented from
a collector in New York. That the
money is real is shown by the
close-ups of the coins.
