

**HOT LAKE PEOPLE
GUESTS AT BANQUET**

DR. McALISTER SUCCEEDS DR. PHY AS MEDICAL DIRECTOR—CHARLES E. KING IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF MUTUAL WELFARE SOCIETY.

HOT LAKE, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special)—Previous to his departure for the Letterman General Hospital at San Francisco, to which place he has been appointed by the government, Captain W. T. Phy last evening entertained the whole of the Hot Lake Sanatorium to a banquet in the main dining room of the institution. More than fifty people sat down to a bountiful dinner, after which speech-making was the order of the evening. Captain Phy spoke feelingly of his regret at leaving his institution, if only for a while, but looked forward with much enthusiastic anticipation to taking up the great work of reconstruction which the government has called upon him to do. Dr. McAlister,

who now becomes medical officer, and Oliver Daseh—now manager of the sanatorium, as did Harold Tinker, bacteriologist, and Charles E. King, each had words of cheer and hopes to their chief, and on behalf of the sanatorium staff, bade him Godspeed, good health and a happy return to Hot Lake. Mrs. Humphreys, head nurse at the sanatorium, was also one of the speakers. At a meeting of the Hot Lake Sanatorium Mutual Welfare Society, Charles E. King was unanimously elected as president of that society, taking the position rendered vacant by the lamentable death of Jim McDougall, who was the sanatorium engineer. At this meeting, a resolution was passed and ordered spread on the minutes of the society, conveying to Mrs. McDougall an expression of the society's deep sympathy with her loss, and extolling the high qualities characteristic of Mr. McDougall's life. Captain Phy left Hot Lake on the No. 5, fast mail, for Portland.

RAYMOND CROSS DEAD
Young Man of Elgin, Succumbs to Operation in France.
Sorrow was again brought to Elgin Monday when a telegram came from Washington announcing the death of Raymond Cross in France, says the Elgin Recorder. The telegram was to Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Cross, parents of the dead soldier, and follows: "Deeply regret to inform you that it is officially reported that Private Raymond J. Cross, Infantry, died of peritonitis following appendicitis, October 24." The telegram was signed by Adjutant General Harris.

Raymond J. Cross was born February 16, 1898, on the farm which he left only a few months ago and was 22 years and eight months old. He was called to the colors and entrained for Camp Lewis, Wash., where he was mustered into Co. G, 158th Infantry. From Camp Lewis he was sent to Camp Kearney, Cal., and was later moved to the Atlantic coast. He landed in France about the 10th of August. Since arriving in France he was permitted to give but little information of his movements and

activities, but his letters always indicated his joy in seeing his country and doing his part to bring victory to the cause of right. Deceased leaves besides the grieving father and mother, five brothers, Lee, George, Charles Dell, and Walter, three sisters, Myrtle, Elsie and Geneva and numerous other relatives. Three brothers of the dead soldier are now serving in the fighting forces of America. Lee and George are members of Co. G, 62nd Inf., and Charles is a member of Battery C, 46th Artillery.
