BOYS AND GIRLS IN SPIRITED DRIVE

VICTORY SOCIETY GOES OVER THE TOP WITH FIRST OF COUNTY DISTRICTS.

As always, the school children of the county have rallied to the call of their country and contributed liberally from their earnings to provide social privileges to the men of the army, according to Mrs. Ivanhoe, county chairman of the Victory Boys and Girls. Mrs. Ivanhoe emphasizes that the students have not been urged to give beyond their means but the value of every little bit they might be able to contribute has been kept constantly before them.

E. E. Kiddle, county campaign manager, looks with approval on the deep interest which the schools have taken in the Victory Boys and Girls movement. In many districts it has been necessary for the boys and girls to educate the local war chest boards to the privilege of having a separate division of the drive.

The following item from a letter from Supt. L. A. Hunting of Union is a tribute to the part the boys and girls have played in the campaign.

"In enclosing lists of subscribers to the 'Liberty Boys and Girls' War Chest fund, I wonder if you will think that our high school boys and girls have won the honors that were to be awarded to schools in which the number of subscribers reached 100 per cent of the goal assigned. Every boy in high school subscribed and 95 per cent of the girls, besides conducting the campaign among the grades.

"The credit of the whole thing goes to the boys and girls who did it. I was a delight to see the enthusiasm and earnestness with which they attacked the problem. Did you ever see a child that did not want to do something real?"

"The epidemic hindered in the campaign a little. Only that kept the high school girls out of the 100 per cent column."

Canterbury's Famous Ghost. Of course, Canterbury cathedral has its ghosts. If rumor be true the ghost of the murdered Thomas a Becket is periodically seen engaged in that last deadly struggle of his with the four miscreant knights at the foot of the altar, and groans and other queer noises are reputed to be heard on the anniversary of his death. FIRST TROOPS ON THE WAY

THREE SHIPS FROM ENGLAND HOMEWARD BOUND

Includes 382 Officers and 6644 Men, Mostly of Air Service Attachments.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—First units of the American expeditionary forces to return from overseas are expected to arrive in New York about the end of the present week. General March, chief of staff, announced last night that 382 officers and 6644 men of the air service and other detachments (training in England now are homeward bound on the Minekanda, Lapland and Orea, British liners. The first two ships left Liverpool last Friday and the Orea sailed on Saturday.

This announcement means that the movement of the American troops now in England, the majority of whom are in air service detachments, will continue steadily until all of them, some 20,000, have returned to this country. There are no regiments or other units of line troops in Great Britain. The first movement of the larger units, such as brigades and divisions, will come from French ports, it is assumed, as the British cross-channel service undoubtedly is completely occupied with the transportation of returning British forces.

Slight Damages Inflicted

Dripping of Gasoline from Tank Results in Explosion.

A small fire occurred yesterday evening at the Auto Electric Service Station when a stream of gasoline leaking from the tank onto a gasoline lamp was ignited by the heat of the exhaust pipe. The fire department was immediately notified but the flames had been extinguished before it arrived. No appreciable amount of damage was done.

GRABBED ALL THE WEALTH.

Ex-Kaiser Accused of Getting Away With Securities.

GENEVA, Nov. 26.—The Kaiser took with him all the government gold and silver securities, using fraud to get them past the government authorities, says the Neue Leitungs Zeitung.

PLAN CAMPAIGN FOR NEXT YEAR

UNION COUNTY AGRICULTURAL COUNCIL WOULD IMPROVE FARMING METHODS

The Union County Agricultural council is in conference today with Paul V. Mapis, state leader of county agricultural agents, with a view to making definite plans for a systematic campaign for improvement of farming conditions here during the next year. Corrective measures for smut and various diseases of plant and animal life, which have been tested will be discussed and new methods adopted after a careful comparison of results achieved in different localities. The livestock industry is occupying a considerable part of the attention of the council. It is believed that through the efforts of several up-to-date breeders here, Union county is fast becoming a center for high grade beef cattle.

Representatives to this council have been appointed by Farmers Unions in such localities as may have organized them. A number represent their districts through their local grange. Members of the council are H. H. Weather- spoon and Bernal Hug of Elgin, Jim Woodell, C. D. Huffman and Walter Pierce of La Grande, Charles Playle and Tom Walsinger of Alsea, J. K. Lantz of Cove and George Benson and Robert Withycombe of Uxton.

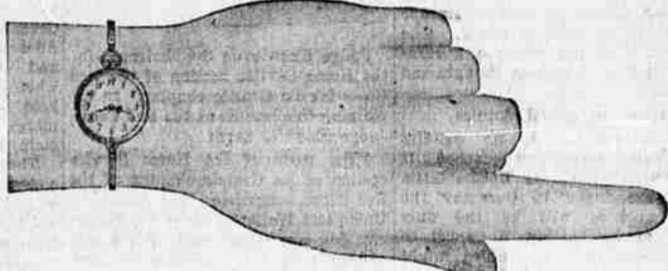
