HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Although the schools will have sessions every Saturday morning until sometime in the spring, they can hardly hope to make up more than nine days, and during the epidemic the schools were closed for twenty-five days. Therefore the teachers must give longer lessons and the students must study harder this winter than they have before. But by this method it is hoped that the work will be covered, and no one will need to drop back for half a year.

The High School students are looking forward with much pleasure to the coming Lyceum course. Owing to the epidemic there have been few entertainments this fall. The students are selling tickets at two dollars each, and expect a large audience for the opening number next December third.

Last week finished the first six weeks of the school year and the students will receive their reports this week.

The High School Glee Club plan to give a patriotic entertainment toward the latter part of January.

"Abroad At Home" is a book of travel, American ramblings observations and adventures by Julian Street, being a journey from New York City to San Francisco and back again.

The chief feature of this book is the description of each important city he visits. He points out a separate and distinct characteristic in each, that is typical of the city and stays in the mind. For instance, the reader will always think of the Grand Central station in New York, three cent street car rate in Cleveland, pig iron in Duluth, the hills of St. Louis and the boaters of San Francisco. The author pictures cities as people, Buffalo, Cleveland and Duluth, he calls "three married sisters who live in the same block."

Julian Street writes in a light, humorous manner, but he gives

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much useful and interesting knowledge. The personal touches and own experience in describing cities make the reader long to travel. He sometimes ridicules a city more than its citizens might enjoy, but he treats one as well as the next. The book is easy reading and never tiresome. In his description of Hannibal, the tumble down Clemens' house and Tom Sawyer's cave, he gives a splendid tribute to Mark Twain. The book gives a fine idea of our own cities, but leaves the reader with a wish to see them for himself.
