"Western Reserve"

When Connecticut, in 1780, ceded her western lands to the United States, she reserved a large tract adjoining Pennsylvania, now forming several counties in the northeastern part of Ohio. From this the region came to be called "The Western Reserve." The reservation by Connecticut only lasted a few years, as in 1800 she completed the transfer of all the lands to the United States. The Western Reserve soon became famous for its good citizenship, fine farms and determined opposition to slavery.

Waging War on the Rabbit.
Australia has spent millions in fighting a pest of rabbits, for which a man who turned loose three pairs of rabbits in New South Wales, in 1850, is responsible, and which has made necessary a wooden wire fence 1,200 miles long, shutting off the fertile agricultural regions from the central and western semi-desert areas, where rabbits must abound. We have a few rabbits in our own country west of the Rockies. According to the biological survey of the department of agriculture, fully 200,000,000 wild rabbits are annually killed in this country. Yet men tearing across the continent invariably speak of the number of rabbits seen.

HERO BELITTLES DEED

Doesn't Think Much of Act That Won Cross.

All He Did Was Swim River Under Fire and Rescue Wounded Frenchman.

Pittsburgh.—"Now listen, get me! There's been so much hot air about this hero stuff that I want you to get it straight. I saw this French bird swim the river and I went and got him. If I hadn't someone else probably would have taken the same chance." In these words Capt. Walter R. Flannery, who was awarded the Cross of War for swimming the Marne river and rescuing a wounded French soldier at the time the Germans held the Alsace-Marne salient, disposes of any attempt to make a hero of him for the deed. At the time Flannery was a lieutenant. He is at his home here on a furlough.

The wounded man lay on the bank across the river from where the Americans were stationed at Savigny. Disregarding a French officer's warning that it probably was a ruse to attract Americans over that the Hun might learn what division opposed them, Flannery waited until nightfall, when he stripped to his underclothing and swam across. The Germans spotted him and most of the trip was under water. Flannery tells the rest of the story as follows:

"When I got over I found the man. All the French I knew was 'ici, là'—here, here—and then the bird went hysterical and refused to come into the water. He was too weak to tie the rope I had brought along, so I had to drag him in. We got over all right. "But the joke was that a couple of days later I got orders to report to a French colonel. Headquarters was about seven miles away, so I hoisted it back, expected to be put on patrol duty of some sort. I presented myself and couldn't find out what the program was. They told me to go stand behind a major. I did, but the major kept rambling around, and me after him like a goof. "Then I was told to go forward on the parade ground, and a French general lined me up, pointed a sword at me and turned on the French. I wasn't much of a conversation for I didn't know what he was talking about. So I just grinned. Then he let down the sword, planned this on me—the Croix de Guerre—and started kissing me. Say, that mugsack tickled me from ear to ear. I'm off saving men after this."

"LEISURE PERILS FIGHTERS"

Library Chief Says Books Keep Vank Soldiers Out of Trouble Overseas.

New York.—Declaring that the "leisure hour" of the American overseas is the hour of greatest moral peril, and that good reading does much to keep lonely soldiers straight, Dr. M. L. Rainey, field manager of the American Library association, has reported to the New York state branch how soldiers, sailors and social workers have been provided with good reading matter. Doctor Rainey said that in ten months the association has established 42 libraries for the army and stocked them with 300,000 books and 2,000,000 magazines, all of which have been contributed. The working force consisted of 318 persons, one-third of whom served without pay.

Scale Reveals Salmon's Age.
A single scale from a salmon will tell its owner's age and whether the fish's pickings have been slim or the opposite. When viewed through a microscope the scale will reveal tiny lines, which have developed at the rate of 10 a year. Lines crowded close prove that the salmon has been living light. Lines widely spread indicate a scant diet.

WAGE WAR ON GRASSHOPPERS

California Authorities Devising Ways and Means to Protect Agricultural Lands From Pest.

Quincy horticultural commissioners throughout California have been asked to forward information on the grasshopper pest reported prevalent in a number of districts, particularly in northern California, to George H. Hecke, state horticultural commissioner. Fragmentary reports received at Hecke's office have indicated that large swarms of grasshoppers have infested agricultural districts in Sutter, Yuba, Lassen, Butte and other counties and have caused considerable damage to crops.

One of the best methods of extermination, an official said, is the spreading of poisoned bran which, which the hoppers devour quickly. Burning of the grass also is an effective means, but the fire menace at this season necessitates the exercise of greatest caution.

Harrowing, by which means the eggs of the hoppers are brought to the surface to be eaten by ants or other insects and flooding the ground also are advocated to prevent hatching. The enforcement of laws for the curbing of pests is vested in the county horticultural commissioners, but in cases where the menace to crops is extensive the state commissioner co-operates in a concerted campaign of extermination, as was done this spring when the state-wide rodent drive was conducted.

Cyclist in Spectacular Feat.

An army motorcycleist at one of the training camps recently averted the death of a young lieutenant by a most extraordinary feat of heroism, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. Racing at high speed across rough ground, he drove his machine into a runaway parachute that was dragging the officer to his death. The latter had made a practice parachute jump of 2,000 feet from an observation balloon. A high wind had carried him a considerable distance and in landing he became hopelessly entangled in the cord. The parachute was caught by a strong air current and blown at terrific speed across the field, pulling the helpless prisoner with it. At the same instant the cyclist, passing along a nearby motor road, saw the officer's plight. He reversed his machine into the field and raced at top speed squarely into the middle of the belated parachute. The ropes fouled the machine and the weight of the latter anchored the desperate cyclist further movement.

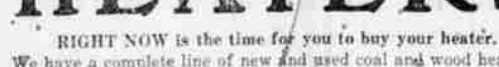
