#### CHANGE REFRESHMENTS INTO MEALS.

A bit of recreation is something we all need. But the United States food administration asks that we change the hours of such parties a bit and make the refreshments of such a nature that they actually furnish supper or luncheon for the guests, thus doing away with the wasteful fourth meal.

1. Stuffed Peppers  
Escalloped Potatoes  
Bermuda Onion and Orange Salad  
Date Custard with Thin Cream
2. Clam Chowder  
Corn Oysters  
Tomato Relish  
Pumpkin Pie
3. Creamed Potatoes  
Cabbage Salad  
Baked Rice Pudding with Custard Sauce

**Stuffed Peppers.** Cut a slice from the stem-end of as many green sweet peppers as needed, remove seeds and partition walls and parboil for five minutes. Brush the inside of each with melted butter or butter substitute and fill with a mixture made of equal quantities of cooked rice and chopped meat or nuts.

Moisten the rice with a little milk. Season the meat with salt, paprika, and a few drops of lemon juice. Mix all together lightly and have it quite moist. Place the peppers in an agate baking pan, surround with boiling water, adding half a tablespoon of fat to half a cup of water. Bake now and then. Cook about fifteen minutes.

**Pumpkin Pie Filling.** Line a pie plate with conservation pastry (combination of wheat and rice flour or corn flour) and fill with the following:

- Two cups pumpkin (cooked and strained); one-half teaspoon ginger;
- one-half teaspoon salt; one-half cup molasses or sorghum; one teaspoon cinnamon; two eggs; two cups milk.

Mix pumpkin with molasses and seasoning. Add beaten eggs and milk. **Meat Loaf.** One pound lean cooked meat; one-eighth pound cooked chopped bacon; two pounded crackers; one well-beaten egg; one teaspoon salt; one-fourth teaspoon nutmeg; one-fourth teaspoon pepper; dash of cayenne.

Put the meat through a meat grinder, add the other ingredients, moisten with left-over gravy, and season more liberally if necessary. Grease a shallow pan with bacon fat, put in loaf, and press into shape, adding a little more thin gravy. Bake half an hour, or until brown on top.

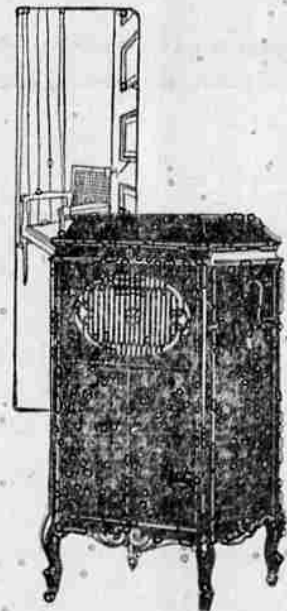
