LOGANBERRY A FAVORITE

Methods of Culture and Use Told in Agricultural Bulletin.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The Logan blackberry, or Loganberry, formerly thought to be a hybrid between a blackberry and a red raspberry, is now considered a variety of the Pacific coast species of trailing blackberry, according to *Farmers' Bulletin* 298, recently published by the United States Department of Agriculture. Because of the different uses to which the Logan blackberry is adapted, its culture has rapidly assumed importance in California, Oregon, and Washington. Large quantities are marketed in the fresh state and they are used extensively in the production of a non-alcoholic beverage, in making jams and jellies, and in the canning industry. Their culture, as well as the culture of related varieties, are discussed in the bulletin.
