### RETURNED SOLDIER VIEW.

"Dobe" Zweifel relates his experience in the Sunny South.

Private Reuben Zweifel, who has just returned from Camp Taylor at Louisville, Kentucky is in a fine state of health and is delighted to be back among his old friends. While in the camp he gained fifteen pounds and is physically fit but now has no war to go to, a thing which he and many of the other boys express a keen regret.

In speaking of the southern camp life Mr. Zweifel said: "When I got in that zone, south of Mason and Dixon's line, I noticed it was 115 degrees in the shade and there no shade except the shade of darkness on the negroes' faces. That, of course, was last August and the thermometer kept playing leap frog with itself until late in the fall. There was a multitude of negroes at every turn in the road and I confess that those dark skinned beauties made no hit with me. The cities of the south are not to be compared with the western cities, but the rural section of the south is very fine. I believe that one could get accustomed to the southern ways and be very much contented in that part of the nation if he would stay out of the large cities.

"I was regimental tailor and naturally was very busy all the time. They drilled me but a few days and then put me to work when they I had a trade. Were I joining again I would never put them wise to my trade for invariably they overlook the soldier qualities in a man and put him to work upon the job for which he has already been trained.

"In a general way the whole military scheme is all right and I am strong for the military. I believe we should teach it in the schools and make the younger generation into physically fit men for any emergency that may arise."
