A sister is Mrs. John Shaw, who has gone to Walla Walla in response to the message announcing the death. Her son, Ben Weathers of Enterprise, has also gone to Walla Walla. The funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.

STATE COUNCIL PLANNING CHILD WELFARE WORK

THE COUNCIL OF DEFENSE TO FURTHER WORK ALONG CHILD LABOR WELFARE LINES—CHANGES MADE IN COMMITTEE

The members of the woman's committee with the national and state committees of the council of defense marked some important changes in the administration of affairs in Oregon.

The child welfare committee, which had been working as a branch of the woman's committee, was made a standing committee of the state council of defense and has been reorganized to meet a wider scope of activities.

The personnel of the child welfare committee of the state council of defense is as follows: Mrs. Fred G. Schilke, chairman, La Grande; Dr. A. C. Seely of the state board of health; Alva B. Milam, dietitian at the O. A. C.; J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction; Millie R. Trumbull, child labor commissioner; and Dr. B. W. De Busk of the child welfare commission of the University of Oregon.

This committee, comprising representatives from all child welfare organizations in Oregon, makes the strongest possible committee that could be gotten together to work for the interests of the children, and Oregon is to be congratulated.

The county committees are made up of the women who acted as county chairmen under the woman's committee with the addition to each county of the county superintendent and the county health officer. The personnel of the child welfare committee for Union county is, therefore, Mrs. George Cochran, chairman; Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe and Dr. Ray Logan.

The keynote of this work may be summed up under three headings—health, recreation, education, of which HEALTH is conceded to be of first importance, followed by a legitimate RECREATIONAL program that has been proved to offset much of juvenile delinquency and an EDUCATIONAL program that will keep all children of school age in school and to see that there is no exploitation of child labor.

The duty in hand is to back to the limit the efforts of the state board of health to secure an appropriation sufficient to cover the general health conditions of the state, and if this is accomplished we are assured of child-hygiene have such a department of the state board of health.

Only four states in the union have such a department and the children's bureau at Washington is anxiously looking to Oregon to take the fifth place in the nation, in this much needed field of action.

A concise recommendation from the state committee will be presented to the various legislative committees of the state asking their support.

Immediately after the holidays a "Back-to-school" drive will be launched in order to get the children, who for various reasons have quit school, back into the school rooms. This part of the work will be vigorously pushed by the county school superintendents and teachers throughout the state, and with the earnest help of the child labor authorities.
