HARRIS GROCERY HAS NEW TRUCK

Mr. Harris, of the Hooverized Grocery store, put a new delivery truck to work on his local business a few days ago. The new truck will make possible the operation of an exclusive delivery and will give a service that will represent the store and one that can be depended upon in every respect.

While the Hooverized grocery is a "cash and carry" grocery and customers are encouraged to carry small parcels whenever it is convenient to do so, yet it has been found necessary to provide a delivery service that will carry heavy packages and large orders.

One of the new benefits to be derived from the new service is in connection with the fact that it is operated and maintained on a cost basis to all customers. The present cost for delivering an order of any size is ten cents. Mr. Harris states that this plan of supplying his customers with delivery service at cost was inaugurated about a year ago, upon the opening of the Hooverized store, and that this method has not only been found right in theory, but it has proven a practical plan and is the most economical method known.

One of the outstanding features of this service is that it encourages housewives to anticipate their requirements and to order a reasonable supply at one time. "This method saves for our customers," said Mr. Harris, proprietor. "It encourages thrift and in fact it is such methods, together with the co-operation on the part of the public that have made it possible for us to hold the cost of food in La Grande down to a lower point than in any other place in the northwest."
