MR. EMAHISER'S BOXING BILL

WILL BE INTRODUCED BY SENATOR PIERCE.

Bill Has Found Favor in Many Quarters and Supporters Are Confident It Will Pass

Walter M. Pierce, senator for Union and Wallawa, will ask the coming session of the state legislature to legalize boxing in this state. As the provisions of the new bill are very strict and as he already has numerous friends and strong advocates, it is quite likely that the measure will pass. It is probably the most stringent athletic bill that has ever been offered for the consideration of Oregon law-makers. It embodies the very best regulations selected from the boxing laws of various states now operating under the commission arrangement. It is fathered by C. D. Emahiser, who has added several good features of his own, with the expectation that the bill thus formulated will be acceptable to the legislators and the people that they represent.

The bill is especially attractive to the boys who have gone over and won the battle for democracy, who will demand that they have the same amusement and healthful exercise that they enjoyed during their service, and as the Government and the heads of all war service activities have put their stamp of approval on boxing, wrestling and all other forms of athletics, this measure with its proper regulations should go through without much opposition.

The bill is so drawn that it eliminates all prize fighting features, all "roughness" to which so much justifiable objection has been raised in connection with handling exhibitions of this kind in the past. The measure provides for a state commission that will be composed of one member from the law and only regularly organized clubs, under heavy bond will be granted licenses to stage athletic events under the strict regulations provided therein.

The bill is so drawn that it provides for the distribution of a portion of the receipts from the sale of tickets for every show, stipulating that a percentage of the gross receipts from the sale of admission tickets be paid to the state treasurer to be used for operating expenses of the cat. It also provides further disposition of proceeds from entertainments to go to a fund for disabled and crippled soldiers.

It limits boxing contests to six rounds of three minutes. It regulates the weight of gloves to be used; it bars boys under eighteen from participating in contests; No betting or wagering will be allowed in buildings where contests are held. It will compel contestants to break clean and not hold and hit, prohibits butting with head or shoulders, wrestling or illegal use of elbows, using of abusive or insulting language or any unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of the contestants. It provides a severe penalty for fake boxing, not only for the contestant but provides that any club encouraging sham contests will forfeit their license in addition to paying a heavy fine to the state.

Under this bill there can be no prize fighting—simply a limited boxing contest—a trial of skill and endurance and as harmless and as interesting as wrestling match.

Mr. Emahiser, who is framing this bill, is not a professional sport promoter. He is at the head of a well known local wholesale home and is one of the hardest workers in the city. He is a successful and enterprising business man and in the sport game is recognized as a leader who is on the square. He makes
