FLU IS KILLING WILD GAME OFF

BIG RIVER, Sask., Jan. 6.—Hunters returning from the wild regions in northern Saskatchewan report that influenza is decimating big game and that for time smaller animals in the district have shown marked symptoms of the disease. Investigation has disclosed diseased lungs among moose that became exhausted quickly when pursued. After investigating conditions around Pelican lake and Witchekan lake in the big game country, Dr. Nichols of Dedben reported that heavy losses among the animals would not be surprising.

Toad's Good Service.
 The toad is useful because of its diet. No less than 83 specimens of insects, mostly injurious, have been proved to enter into its dietary. George W. Hunter says: A toad has been observed to snap up 128 flies in half an hour. Thus at a low estimate it could easily destroy 1,000 insects during a day and do an immense service to the garden during the summer. It has been estimated that a single toad may, on account of the cutworms which it kills, be worth \$19.88 each season that it lives.
