DALLAS, Jan. 3.—Private Armin O. Young, a former resident of this city and a member of the old Third Oregon, has recently returned from France and visited with friends in this city lately. He is the first Polk county boy to return from overseas, and was given a hearty welcome by his friends. He was reported as missing last September, but word was later received from him from a hospital. After receiving treatment in the foreign hospitals he was sent to the United States and was in a hospital here for some time. He has now fully recovered from his wound with the exception of a paralysis of the thumb and forefinger on his right hand. He is now on a thirty-day furlough.
