SETTING UP EXERCISES IN THE ARMY DO GOOD WORK

Boys Returning Will Be Envied Their Splendid Health and Bearing.

Hundreds of young men in and about La Grande are today physically developed and in perfect condition. In sharp contrast to the day they quit office, counter, shop and farm to his way to Uncle Sam's field of duty—the field of soldiering.

Have you noticed the sprightliness of step? The set of shoulders of a soldier boy? Do you know the cause?
 More than anything else it was the daily "setting up exercises" every soldier gets in camp life. The nature of these exercises are such that they should build up every muscle and bone and go to make a perfect man. Added to this the regular hours of work, play, eat and sleep the soldier enjoys except in the trenches, he has become a perfect specimen physically.
 Now a problem arises. The boys are home in physical condition and are suddenly and ruthlessly torn away from regular, consistent exercise. What is the result? They immediately begin to go back to the shuffling step, the stooped shoulder, the caved-in chest and lanky development of the office man, clerk and farmer. This for want of scientific

exercise.

SECRETARY OF LABOR WILSON ISSUES WARNING

Arrest and Deportation For Any Bolsheviks Found in the United States.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—As the first concerted movement by the United States government to combat the reported growth of Bolshevism in this country, Secretary of Labor Wilson today ordered the arrest and detention, pending deportation, of all aliens found advocating anarchy or the destruction of property.

"No steps will be taken against any alien simply for joining the I. W. W.," said Wilson, "but the government intends to arrest, detain or deport aliens, whether they belong to the I. W. W. or not, who are found advocating Bolshevism, which means either anarchy or the destruction of property."

Good Sugar-Producing Country.
