School Attendance Is Getting Back to Normal Again

Conditions in the local schools continue to improve steadily in regard to the effect of the influenza epidemic upon the attendance. Figures secured by The Observer yesterday afternoon from City Superintendent Hampton show that the number of scholars registered each day is gradually working back closer to normal again.

The enrollment in the High school on December 21st, the day before the dismissal for the holidays, was only 144. Yesterday it was 182. Principal DuBois says that the attendance at this time is more consistent than it has been at any time during the year. The total enrollment in the High School is 239.

Greenwood school, just before the holidays, had an enrollment of 198, while Mr. Hampton's report showed that there were 251 scholars there yesterday. Central had 432 yesterday, as against 318 on December 21, and Riveria had 189 as against 174 on December 21.

The total enrollment at Greenwood is 323, at Riveria 276, and at Central 527. Normal attendance is calculated at about 95 per cent, of the total enrollment. Considering the fact, then, that there are probably as many scholars remaining away from school on account of fear of the epidemic as there are staying out because there is illness in the home, it becomes apparent that the influenza is not nearly so wide-spread in the city as it was two weeks ago.

U. OF O. TO BEGIN DRILL

EUGENE, Jan. 10.—The faculty of the university have met and decided to give one-term hour of academic credit to each student taking the three hours a week of military work provided in this organization. Drill will be under the direction of Colonel William H. C. Bowen. Membership in the reserve officers' training corps will be compulsory for all able-bodied students.
