PERUVIAN STRIKE RIOT

Attack Arsenal and Railway Stations; Troops Restoring Order

LIMA, Peru, Jan. 15.—A mob of strikers attacked the arsenal here Tuesday, but was driven off by the troops. There were also many small encounters between strikers and troops throughout the city. The strikers made an unsuccessful attempt to burn the Callao railway station.

Hotel employees Tuesday joined the strike and virtually all the hotels and restaurants are closed. The food problem threatens to become serious. Communication with Mynococha, where the copper miners struck Monday, when a general strike was proclaimed throughout the republic, has been interrupted.

First Attempt to Explore Africa.

The first organized attempt to explore the interior of Africa was made by Mungo Park, who set sail on his final voyage to the Dark Continent 127 years ago. He returned two years and seven months later after having explored a considerable section of Africa before being visited by a white man, although he failed in his main purpose which was to trace the source of the River Niger.

ELGIN FARMER IS SILO BOOSTER

(From The Elgin Recorder) A. H. Parsons, a well known farmer and stockman of the flat, is one of the most enthusiastic of the large number of Union county silo boosters, although he joined their ranks only last summer, at which time he had his first silo constructed in preparation for the new silo. Mr. Parsons planted twenty-one acres of land to field corn. From the 21 acres of corn he obtained 100 tons of ensilage. In fact the 100 tons of ensilage cut was obtained from nine acres and the balance was cut for fodder, and made considerably more than 100 tons. He is now cutting up the fodder with his ensilage cutter and feeding it in feeders to his cattle and sheep and is obtaining excellent results. The corn is mixed with the fodder and Mr. Parsons says that his cattle eat every particle of it, and the sheep are doing nearly as well, and what is more they are taking on flesh at a rapid rate.

"Why, there's nothing like it," said Mr. Parsons. "I not only obtained over 200 tons of feed from my 21 acres, but obtained a feed that will put meat on my stock, and they will not come out in the spring looking like hat racks."

Mr. Parsons planted two varieties of corn, Minnesota 13 and Mercer Hybrid, and planted an equal amount of each. He reports the former produced the heavier fodder and larger corn, but that the latter matured much earlier.

Several silos were erected in this section last season and the experience of the owners is all that is needed to warrant that the number will be greatly exceeded this year.

Parsons says he will plant corn again this year. By-the-way, the Parsons farm is one of the best improved farms in Union county.

VANCE McCORMICK QUILTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Vance C. McCormick has resigned as chairman of the Democratic national committee, and it is understood that he is under consideration for appointment as American ambassador to France to succeed William Graves Sharp. Mr. Sharp's resignation, it is said, is now in the hands of the President, but no announcement of the fact has yet been made.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 15.—Fourteen alleged Bolshevik sympathizers were in jail here Sunday awaiting investigation of an attack made Sunday upon police who attempted to break up what they called a "Red Flag" parade.

The parade following a meeting at which Industrial Workers of the World speakers urged a general strike in all industries, to stop the manufacture and shipment of supplies for the American army in Russia.

Police Captain W. H. Searing, who led nearly 100 policemen in an attempt to stop the parade, was attacked by the paraders. A crowd estimated at nearly 5000 gathered on the downtown streets when the riot occurred.
