## URGE CHANGES IN GAME LAWS

### THE UNION COUNTY SPORTSMEN WANT SEASONS CHANGED.

#### China Pheasant Act and Re-establishment of Hatchery Included in Proposed Legislation.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Jan. 20.—Indications here are that the game committee at this session of the state legislature will have their hands full, even though the State Fish and Game Commission has hesitated to introduce new legislation. Many recommendations have come in for consideration at present session, and Senator Eberhard has a long list of them from the Wing, Fla. and Fleetwood Club, one of the largest of the Eastern Oregon red and gun associations.

One of the main recommendations of this club is to open the deer hunting season 30 days later than now and to close 30 days later than at present. It is understood that the main reason for this recommendation is to keep the season back until the snow is on the ground and tracking can be done.

**Meat Saving Now Impossible.** The club asserts that the open season as it now exists makes it almost impossible to save the meat of the deer during the early part of the season.

Suggestion is also made that grouse in the eastern part of the state begin to work back into the high mountains about August 1, and the season does not open until August 15, at which time it is almost impossible to get good shooting in the lower altitudes, and it would be better to have the open season start on August 1, as in former years, to provide better shooting.

The duck season, as it stands, is satisfactory to the club, as closing of the spring season, the members declare, greatly improves the fall shooting, although feeding on marshes should be established and maintained, they say.

**Elk Protection is Urged.** The China pheasant seasons in Baker and Wallowa counties are now closed and this works a hardship on the Union county sportsmen. The Union county men wish the same season for Baker and Wallowa as now exist in Union as the Union sportsmen say the hunters from Baker and Wallowa crowd into Union county and put the burden on Union county for supplying the birds for all sections of the state.

The closed season on elk should be extended five years longer, say

the Eastern Oregon sportsmen. Re-establishment of the Minner hatchery for trout is another move that is sought, it being declared that the opening of this hatchery on the Wallowa river would provide for the stocking of the streams in Eastern Oregon at a less expense than shipping to the fry from distant points, and that the Eastern Oregon sportsmen need such restocking at the present time.

**Laws Declared Conflicting.** Recommendations for changes in game legislation in Western Oregon are not yet quite as definite as those sought for portions of Eastern Oregon.

Representative Craig, member of the House game committee, says that some consideration is being given to asking for opening of the deer season in this section 15 days later, as the meat is not of the best under the present law, although he declares he is opposed to the plan to run the deer after the snow falls. Some consideration is also being given to a change in the season on ducks.

The present laws in that regard are decidedly conflicting, two entirely different acts on the same subject having been passed by the last legislature.

**Crab Hen is Considered.** The Attorney-General straightened out the tangle, but his opinion reached only a comparatively few people and hundreds of sportsmen have hesitated about indulging in duck hunting at any time because of the apparent conflict which has presented a chaotic condition to the minds of the hunters.

Members of the game committee also are receiving suggestions from Eastern Oregon as to a little earlier opening of the sea hen season, but this has not reached a definite stage as yet.

The China pheasant situation is another one to be met, but so far has taken no definite outline.

Representative Thrift, of Coos county, may introduce a bill to take the ban from shipments of crabs from that county to points outside, but some opposition has developed to this and it is possible the bill will not be introduced.

## NO EXPORTS OF ALSATIAN POTASH

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Information received here in a cablegram from Paris indicates that no Alsatian potash will be available for export to this country for a period of two or three years. It is stated that the Alsatian resources of this valuable product are barely sufficient for the needs of France.

established and the bookkeeping is done through the office of the secretary of state, while under the section quoted the fund created "shall be paid to said commission on warrants drawn on the state treasurer by said commission from time to time."

**Panama-Pacific Bill Cited.** It was the object of the sponsors of the bill to have the money made available that it could be paid out directly to the soldiers without the necessity of sending vouchers through the auditing department of the secretary of state and waiting for warrants to be drawn on these vouchers.

The manner in which this could be obtained, Secretary Oloit stated, would be under a plan similar to that adopted in the Panama-Pacific appropriation bill of the 1913 session, when provision was made for a sum of \$5000 to be provided in a warrant drawn by the secretary of state to be paid over to the commission.

**Defect is Pointed Out.** The position of the auditing department of the secretary of state's office as to the validity of the soldiers' relief bill was upheld by Attorney General Brown when he telephoned to James B. Kerr advising him to prepare an amendment to the bill to correct the apparent defect which has been caused by the wording of section 4.

It is believed no particularly serious consequences will follow the discovery of the error further than to delay the operation of the commission in its relief work for a time. However, some of the senators here expressed themselves as being inclined to possibly take a different view on the bill than they did at first, when it comes up for amendment.

The commission already has been appointed by the governor and the measure signed by the executive and the heads of the two houses.

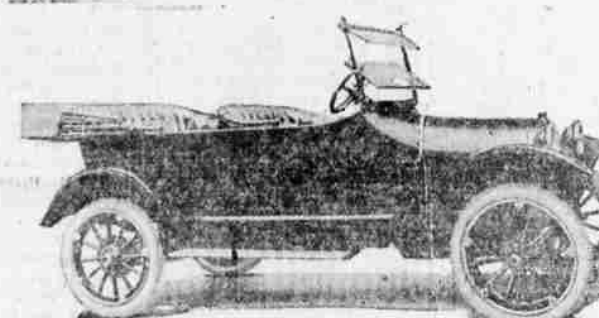
