DOROTHY DALTON SCORES IN "THE KAISER'S SHADOW"

Strong Story Deals With German Spy Plots and Operations of U. S. Secret Service Agents.

LIVE STOCK REPORT

Movements of Stock Brisk in Portland Markets This Week.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—A good supply of live stock was on hand at the union stock yards, North Portland, on Monday morning. After a rather listless week-end, in which very few sales were made, the market opened this morning with decided briskness. The total receipts Monday were 1570 cattle, 56 calves, 2630 hogs, and 1990 sheep.

The cattle in the yards this morning were a heavy looking lot, but the buyers were slow in taking hold. The demand has lessened only slightly and by noon the butchers were fairly active. Prime steers brought \$13.00 to \$14.00; and the demand was good. The better grades of cattle were off about fifty cents on the majority of the sales this morning, steers, however, were than holding their own. A good many calves went at \$8.50 to \$10.00; canners \$3.50 to \$5.00 and bulls \$4.00 to \$5.00, with only a moderate demand.

Hog sales during the past week seemed restricted to present needs and the market was rather dull and draggy. This morning found a better market with a top quotation of \$17.00, an advance of 20 cents over the market of last week. A large supply of hogs has been on the market for the past week and the market for a few days previous to date was rather inactive with a tone of weakness prevailing. Today's sales give pork sales a more healthy aspect with a moderate demand.

In the sheep market lambs are continuing their upward trend in price and this morning a new top on prime lambs was established when \$14.50 was quoted with a strong and growing demand. The lamb market has been steady and active for the past week and at no time has the supply been equivalent in the calls for lambs.

Cattle quotation are as follows: For best steers \$12.50 to \$14.00; good to choice steers \$11.00 to \$12.00; medium to good steers \$9.50 to \$10.00; fair to good steers, \$8.50 to \$9.50; common to fair steers, \$7.50 to \$8.50; good to choice cows and heifers, \$9.50 to \$10.50; medium to good cows and heifers, \$8.50 to \$9.50; canners, \$3.50 to \$5.00; bulls \$4.00 to \$5.00; calves, \$5.50 to \$10.00; stockers and feeders, \$6.50 to \$8.50.

Hog quotations: Prime mixed, \$16.75 to \$17.00; medium mixed, \$16.50 to \$16.75; rough heavies, \$15.00 to \$16.00; pigs, \$14.00 to \$15.00.

Sheep quotations: Prime lambs, \$13.75 to \$14.50; fair to medium lambs, \$9.00 to \$11.00; yearlings, \$10.00 to \$11.50; wethers, \$9.00 to \$10.00; ewes, \$6.00 to \$8.00.

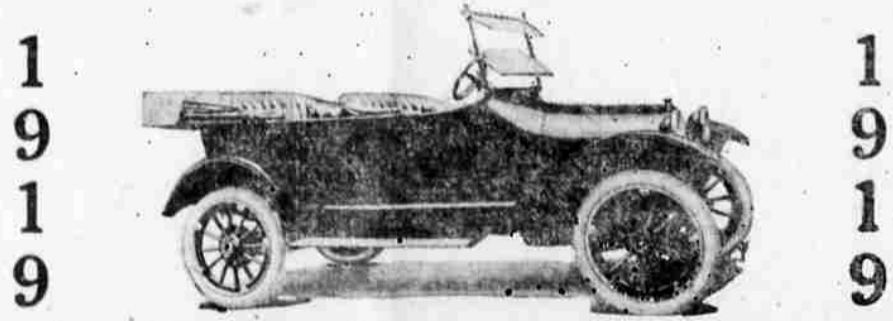
