## CITY MANAGER MAKES REPORT

The following is the complete weekly report of John Collier, manager of the City of La Grande, as presented to the Board of City Commissioners at their regular meeting last night:

La Grande, Oregon, Jan. 22, 1919. To the Honorable Commission, City of La Grande, Oregon.

Gentlemen: I have to report for the week ending January 18, 1919:

One fire call at 909 C ave. The fire was caused by a defective fuse, and the alarm not being turned in until after the fire had gained considerable headway the house was practically destroyed. The property is owned by James Mulholland and was occupied by Alex Ferguson. Loss \$500.

The police department reports nine arrests for the week, two for state offenses, 1 for drunkenness, 2 for having liquor in possession, one for traffic violation and three for violation of the quarantine orders. Amount of fines and forfeitures collected \$45.00.

The street force were employed two and one-half days in cleaning streets, and the water department principally in thawing frozen pipes, the total cost for the week being \$89.77.

The water situation remains about the same, the supply from Beaver creek being about one-half of the amount required for city use. The chlorination plants are being installed today and the water in the system should be clarified within the next week according to the statement of the expert in charge.

I think it advisable as stated in my former report to have a survey or examination of the Beaver creek water shed with the view of ascertaining just how much water is to be had from that source. We have had a measurement made this week of the flow of water in the west fork of Beaver creek at a point one mile above its confluence with the main stream. This flow is about equal to that in the main stream and if it can be put in the pipe line as appears possible at this time, the supply of water from Beaver creek should be very much increased.
