In his letter, which was dated December 29th, he says:

"I am well and having a good time now—the best we have had since we have been in Europe. It is just like real living once more. I think I will be home before long. I have heard from the Hut that we are expected to parade down Pennsylvania avenue in Washington, D. C., on Washington's birthday, 1919.

I guess there has been a large number of troops mustered out. We see a paper once in a while. We might leave on his the tenth of January. I only hope so, as old little La Grande will look good to me.

"I have received all the boxes you sent. I got the Christmas box the week before Christmas. Our mail has been delayed getting out here for a while. I am sending you a menu card, which is a souvenir of our Christmas dinner, and some pictures. I sure would like to hear a phonograph and eat some home canned fruit once more. My mouth waters for a good apple.

"We all have a bunch of souvenirs. We were all glad when the armistice was signed, although we did not know it for a couple of days after it was signed up; so you see news does not travel very fast over here. I will say that we are not a bit sorry.

"I received a cheque from the O. W. R. & N. Co. War Auxiliary, but not know where I can get it cashed. I had a pair of French 37's for a keep sake, but someone got away with one of them. Tell everyone I know that said 'hello,' and to get La Grande all fussed up for a good time, for some day in the near future we will be back with colors all flying and bells on. Thank the folks for the Christmas things, as we all appreciate 'made in America' presents."
