SCARCITY OF HELP FOR 1919

NEED FOR FARM LABOR TO BE GREAT THIS YEAR.

Department of Agriculture Plans Further Efforts to Furnish Men for Harvest Fields.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—Even if peace treaties should be formally executed before the next harvest season, farm labor conditions in the United States will not automatically return in 1919 to pre-war conditions...

Officials of the department suggest that the farm labor situation in 1919 may be quite as serious as that of 1918. A large part of our army may remain in Europe throughout the year.

What Wheat Average Means. The area of winter wheat sown in the fall of 1918 is estimated by the department of agriculture at 49,027,000 acres, which is 15.9 per cent more than the revised estimated area sown in the fall of 1917.

The winter wheat acreage speaks a volume in regard to the need for farm help. Three or four men will be needed to harvest what one man has planted—and there has been no claim that there was a surplus of labor for the planting operations.

Permanent Labor Advocated. The department of agriculture plans to maintain its organization that aided in supplying farm labor in 1919. It will aim to tap every source of emergency help—men, women, and girls from the cities, the Boys' Working Reserve, and other organizations of that sort.

The main effort of the department, however, is to be centered on placing men permanently as helpers on the farms. Permanent labor, employed the year around under good living conditions and at fair wages, is believed to be one of the prime needs on literally millions of American farms.

Many soldiers and men who have left the farm for war industries—and figures show that war industries took more men from the farms than were given to the army—are expected to return to the farms if they are offered permanent and profitable employment.

What is the farmer's part in making farm labor permanent? In the first place, permanent officials believe, every farm that has an idle period during a part of the year should so plan its operations that there will be work through every season. Corps can be rotated, live stock fed, dairying, pruned, and poultry produced. These activities, added to grain production, will solve the problem in many sections, it is believed.

Homes for Hired Men. Large numbers of married men should be working on the farms, it is stated. To get them, better tenant houses are needed in many cases, and permanent employment is a prime necessity. To help meet the need for good tenant houses, the department has developed plans for model structures.

Co-operation Helps Farmers. One feature of the department's work deals with stimulating co-operation and exchange of labor among farmers. For example, it recently has listed the heads of more than 1,000 threshing rings in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan. These rings include from three to twenty farms and involve not only the cooperative purchase of a threshing machine but also the cooperative arrangement of crews for harvesting and threshing.

The plan has proved so successful that the same idea is spreading to other kinds of farms which can best be handled by crews or teams of men.

ARMENIANS ANXIOUS

Turks Reported to Have Joined Tartars in Raiding Villages.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Intense anxiety is felt by Armenians here over reports that large bodies of Turkish troops have joined Tartar bands and are attacking Armenian villages. It is feared that still another chapter of atrocities will be added to the Turkish record before the allies are able to relieve the beleaguered Armenian towns.

Details still are lacking of the massacre at Baku after the Turks, reinforced by Tartar and German troops, had captured the city. Unofficial reports to the Armenian bureau here indicate that about 20,000 people were slaughtered in Baku and vicinity.

\$110. The fire chief had reported that the hose now in use was in very bad shape.

An ordinance establishing the salaries for the officers and employees of the city of La Grande was read the first, second and third times and passed. The list is as follows, the amount of salary placed on a monthly basis:

Another position in the fire department will be vacant February 1st. Harold Taal having given notice of leaving, but the city manager said he had engaged no one for this place yet.

The appointment of a city attorney to succeed J. D. Slater, has also been held in abeyance.

Having Water Analyzed. Regarding the purity of the city water at this time, the manager said he could not definitely say that it was safe to use without being boiled.

The chlorine filter has been at work for a week, and according to the representations of the Jewel Filter company it should be perfectly safe now. Samples of the water have been sent to the state board of health for analysis, however, and the report on it is expected in a day or two.

Manager's Report. The city manager's weekly report, laid before the board, was as follows: "I have to report for the week ending January 25, 1919:

Two fire calls, one from 1508 Fourth street and one from Depot and Jackson avenues. The former was for burning fine and the latter on account of some cloth burning in a house at 1301 Jackson avenue. No material damage was done and no hose or chemicals used. The police report eight arrests for the week, six for violating the prohibitive orders, one for traffic violation and one for smoking cigarettes. Amount of fines collected, \$47.00, and pound fees, \$1.00.

The chlorination plants for treating the water are installed and have been operating since January 24. Samples of water have been sent to the state board of health for analysis and we hope to have the report soon that the water is entirely safe for domestic use. The supply from Denver creek remains about the same, there being no thaw as yet at the intake. In this connection I would say it seems imperative that we decide at an early date as possible just what steps are necessary to guarantee an ample supply of good water for the city, and with this end in view I am submitting herewith all the correspondence I can find on file relating to the subject."
