SECRET SERVICE MAN THROWN FROM MOTOR CAR BY SPIES

To be thrown from a swiftly moving automobile down a steep declivity into a river, is a dangerous experience even in motion pictures, but this is one of the gripping situations in "The Hun Within," a special Paramount-Artcraft picture, which will be shown at the Arcade theatre today. ## SHERRY'S

WILLIAM FARNUM IN "ROUGH AND READY"

"Rough" is a word which has been much abused in the exploitation of motion pictures, but "Rough and Ready" at the Sherry theatre today certainly has that quality in abundance. William Farnum, who has been featured with such great success in many William Fox productions, has a congenial role in this play, which has the frozen north as its background. As the stout-hearted Bill Stratton he is seen as a strict self-disciplinarian who is as straightforward in his dealings with others as he is with himself. Rather than tell an untruth he sacrifices himself to save the home of a friend from destruction. Misunderstanding, his sweetheart imagines he has been unfaithful to her and jilts him. Stratton is stunned at first by the force of this terrible blow to his feelings. He decides to seek solace in the long, long trail in the northwest, where the keen, cold winds make one forget all about the joy of living. The arrival of the girl, Evelyn, in the little village of Yellow Gulch, in which he is living, results in complications which form the basis of an absorbingly interesting story, and before Stratton wins the vindication due him he has to fight as few men have fought to clear his name. In every essential detail "Rough and Ready" is unusual—in the high heroic standard, in the quality of the photograph, in the novelty of the double and triple exposures, in the beautiful settings in the snow-covered mountains, in the excellence of the direction of Richard Stanton, and in the dramatic value of the story. Others in the cast who have important roles are Alphonse Giber, Joe Arnold, David Higgins, Frank Newton, Mabel Hardine and Franklin McGlynn.

## BAKER URGES ABANDONMENT OF NATIONAL GUARD CAMPS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Abandonment of fourteen of the sixteen national guard camps and purchase of all the sixteen national army cantonments was urged by Secretary Baker and Assistant Secretary Crowell at an exhaustive session of the house committee on military affairs. Baker proposed that the government acquire the national guard camps at Camp Kearny, Cal., and at Camp Sevier, in South Carolina.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Total net earnings of the twelve federal reserve banks during 1918 aggregated \$55,436,978, according to an announcement by the federal reserve board this afternoon. The net earnings by the banks follows: Boston, \$3,505,180; New York, \$22,234,033; Philadelphia, \$3,276,824; Cleveland, \$4,224,678; Richmond, \$2,325,227; Atlanta, \$1,665,685; Chicago, \$6,831,973; St. Louis, \$1,959,807; Minneapolis, \$1,557,546; Kansas City, \$2,762,708; Dallas, \$1,554,192; San Francisco, \$3,117,215.
