

# With the Colors

FROM A LETTER WRITTEN HOME BY HUGH HULSE

It has been about two weeks since I have written, but at present there is much to write about.

I guess I will have to go back about six months and tell you the things that have happened since then.

The last letter I wrote you from the States was from Laurel, Maryland, where our train had over one day. We pulled out there about six o'clock, June 15th, and passed through Baltimore just before dark.

We stopped there about ten minutes and a trainload of negro troops passed by. We got into Philadelphia about nine o'clock and there was certainly a crowd there to meet us. Many of the boys in my regiment were from that city, and all their people were there to see them.

We never got off the train, and they did not get to see them but a few minutes. I was glad for once that I was three thousand miles from home.

rolled out of our bunk and waited until it rained. The second time and then I went out to look out a run. There was a crowd of people on the life raft and here they were.

We were in the Gulf stream. We missed several fishing boats and one of two other ships, and a five o'clock sailing ship but we went just as though they were standing still.

The 21st and 22nd were uneventful and I was a little sick. Sunday afternoon the alarm bells sounded and we were waiting for the signal to go on deck when one of the forward guns opened fire.

We began to think we had met a submarine at last and as soon as we got on deck sure enough off to our right and a little ahead of us was what appeared to be the periscope and turret of a submarine.

The guns from both ships were firing as fast as they could reload the shells shrapnel the water all around it but none of them struck it. It looked as though we might get a swim in the salt water after all.

We then marched on board the ship on one of the lower decks and down through long aisles of bunks made of iron pipes and canvas.
