With the Colors

A letter received by Mrs. B. J. Johnson, from her brother Edwin Lindsay in France.

Dear Cora: I suppose you think I am never going to answer your letter or rather letters. Well, I am now on the Rhine and am having a fine time, so you see I am making up for lost time.

We saw some lively sights on our way up here, such as the castles on the Rhine and the Lorelei rock, which I suppose you have read about. I wouldn't take anything for the experience and adventure which I have gone through. Caroline, this war has been a great thing and has taught me many things and I am glad I can say that I went through it all without a scratch, but I have come away a few times. But I have a miss as good as a mile.

I haven't done anything for the past week but write letters as I was so far behind, but now I am nearly caught up.

I just wrote to mother and told her lots of news so you read here. I have been in several important battles, such as the battle of the Marne at Chateau Thierry, the siege at Metz and Verdun. The latter was much the worse. We were on the front at Verdun when the armistice was signed and believe me we were certainly a happy bunch to think we didn't have to keep driving on through.

It has been almost two months since it all ended and I can still hear the whistle of those old shells. It is absolutely the most terrible weird sound that I ever heard.

Well Caroline, I hope it won't be long till I am back in the states again but can't tell much about it. Well, I must close for now as I have some work to do.

Mrs. Mary Brown, of 1806 X avenue, is in receipt of the following letter from her son, James D., written at Segondouf, Germany, Dec. 20:

"Dear Mother: As the war is over I have a feeling fine. I did not like to write to you and tell you that I was going across the big pond for fear you might worry. But I got here just the same; arrived in France August 25. In the harbor of Brest my replacement battalion joined the Second division. On the first of September I was taken with the Spanish flu. I was in the field hospital when the drive on St. Meheil was started. I heard the first gun fired in the barrage and it sure sounded great to me. I was able to join my company on the 17th. Five days later I joined Brother Neil—the first time I had seen him since we parted in Texas in May. He sure looked fine. That night we took cannons to the front lines. The fast-forward was too slow for me as I wanted to see what war was like. We rode about six hours and then laid in the woods, ten kilometers behind the lines, for two days and two nights. On October 1 at 4 o'clock our barrage opened on the Hun. No Fourth of July celebration ever sent out fire works that would compare with the fire of the German guns on that night. It was a grand sight. Next morning just after we formed in line I saw Neil sitting in his dug out smoking a cigarette. The big shells were landing close around us. We were under shell fire at that point for ten days. At last we got out of range of the Hun guns and it seemed nice.

"We were hiking around France until the latter part of October then we started for the front again. On November 1 at 4:30 o'clock we went over the top and advanced nine kilometers the first day. We took plenty of prisoners and it was the same thing—over the top every day until the night of the 10th of November. We crossed the Meuse river on that dark night and took the east side. The Hun's machine gun bullets were striking the earth like hail around us. At 11 o'clock the next day the firing ceased, and it seemed like we were suddenly landed in paradise.

"I have been following the Germans ever since. We came through Belgium and Luxembourg and now we are in Germany; six miles north of the Rhine river which is sure a beautiful stream.

"Neil is also in the Second division. As I told you thirteen of his boys enlisted on June 13, 1917 and started put together. I do not know where the other twelve are but you can guess the rest. I count myself the lucky thirteen as they told us it was an unlucky day and an unlucky number.

"I don't know when I will get home but I hope to have dinner with you on the Fourth of July."

(In the official orders published immediately after the armistice was signed the Second division is especially mentioned. During the latter part of October the Second division was ordered to join the First American army for the great attack of November 1. It was given the post of honor and led the advance.

drove through the enemy's fortified lines to a depth of over nine kilometers, seized the heights of Bonyville and destroyed the enemy divisions on its front. On November 3 it advanced to Fosse and attacked and captured the heights of Vaux. At night it pressed forward through the forest of Belval by a single road and occupied the ridge near Beaumont. On the night of the 4th it again attacked and advanced its lines to the Meuse. Finally, on the night of the 10th the Second division forced its way across the Meuse and seized a commanding position on the eastern bank, and this position was maintained up to the time the armistice was declared.)

PRINCESS ENLISTS

Indian Royalty Will Assist in Y. M. C. A. Work in France.

A real Indian princess, great-granddaughter of King Coweskwew, chief of the Cherokee for forty years, is in France working in the Red Triangle house of the Y. M. C. A., according to E. A. McCarl, western executive of the National War Council.

The princess is Gallohi, otherwise Miss Anne Ross, daughter of Robert Ross, who was a hereditary "king" of the Cherokee of Oklahoma and she comes from Talequah, former capital of the Cherokee nation in the foothills of the Ozarks. For two years she appeared as a lecturer, singer and dancer with Ernest Thompson Seton, the naturalist, giving recitals of folk lore and songs and dances of the various American Indian tribes. She was chosen to pose for the Zolmay statue of Sequoyia, an ancestor, and the inventor of the Cherokee alphabet, which stands in the hall of fame in Washington, and she officiated at the unveiling of the statue.

The princess' Indian name—Gallohi—means "One who does things well." By way of entertaining the boys who gather in the "Y" canteens she will sing Indian songs and tell Indian legends, though she says she is just as ready to serve soup and sandwiches.

She has education, talent and beauty and has several times been a mediator between the Oklahoma Indians and the white residents—all of this experience an asset for a Y. M. C. A. worker in a hard-working canteen where fact is at a premium.
