ZWEIFEL HOME FROM MEETING

GREATLY PLEASED WITH DELCO LIGHT CONVENTION.

Machines Explained and Delco System Now Thoroughly Understood.

Nate Zweifel and wife returned from Portland last night where they had been for the past week. While in the metropolis Mr. Zweifel attended the Delco Light school and convention which was in session. He said to The Observer today: "I was very much interested and benefitted by the school. Mr. Burns of the factory was present and as head engineer he tore down the Delco plants and explained every feature of the great machine to all agents and others present. The work that the Delco Light company has done for the government has been remarkable and was not known until explained at this convention. Over 6500 Delco plants were furnished Uncle Sam during the war. Many of the machines were mounted on trucks to direct wireless, light department headquarters, searchlights near the front trenches and in the aerial service. The part the Delco company has played in winning the war is no small part. Twenty-two agents from the different counties in Oregon were in attendance at the convention. That the Delco individual light plant is popular is evidenced by the fact that some of the dealers have sold more than a hundred plants since the first of the year. Agents are buying them in carload lots and soon the isolated home in every part of the state will not be without its own electric light plant.

While in Portland Mr. Zweifel made arrangements for a large shipment of the machines to La Grande which will be used to supply Union county people.

The Succulent Pleplant.

The pleplant has a recorded history of over four centuries.
