CITY MANAGER'S REPORT.

The following is the weekly report of the city manager laid before the board of commissioners at their meeting last night.

For the week ending February 8, 1919, the several departments report as follows:

One fire at the Ellis barber shop on Depot street. This fire was caused by hot ashes and other debris being dumped in the basement of the building. No serious damage was done, but such a practice is very dangerous and should not be allowed. The tenants have been warned against continuing the practice.

One other fire call at the Foley hotel and another at the Ronde Valley house very from burning flues. There was no damage at the Foley, but some at the Ronde Valley, owing to the fire getting under the floor. The exact damage has not been ascertained as yet.

The police department reports three arrests for the week, one for disorderly conduct and two for traffic violations. Fines collected for the week \$5 and \$2.50 for sale of horse impounded. The treasurer reports:

The street force was used in clearing snow from walks and gutters, three extra teams being used in the outlying districts, cleaning catch basins and the usual street cleaning.

Two metal signs were put on South Fourth street, warning car drivers and others to slow down at the school grounds.

The water department installed pipe on Palmer avenue for one residence and repaired one leak in the mains on Y avenue. Other work done was re-

pairing and reading meters. The total cost for the two departments for the week was \$67.21. The street superintendent, Earl Smith, spent some time this morning over the streets and sidewalks in various parts of the city with a view to making repairs and improvements.

I have also had the matter up with the city engineer and it is our opinion that a plan can be worked out to grade and gravel some of the principal city streets to a comparatively small cost. The condition of the streets in some parts of the city is certainly bad.

The matter of the water supply has also been given further consideration. The city engineer has submitted a report and opinion on the situation which I transmit herewith.

I have also taken up with other parties the proposition of having a survey made of the whole situation, and would recommend that this be done by competent parties.

The new fire chief has arrived from Camp Lewis and entered upon his duties this morning. This makes the force complete again and relieves the volunteer men who have so kindly helped us during the delay in getting Mr. Lindsay released from the service. In this connection I would mention that the fire truck needs some overhauling and I would like authority to have this done. We have ordered the chemical hose and the stove for the engines as authorized by the commission and have word that the 500 feet of fire hose ordered some time ago is on the way.

The treasurer's statement for January shows a surplus in some funds which could be used in the retirement of general fund warrants and I recommend that this surplus be used for that purpose.

A report just received from the state health officer shows the water supply now practically free from impurities and entirely safe for domestic use. We had some trouble with one of the chlorine tanks leaking last week, but this has been replaced by a new one and the plants are working all right now.

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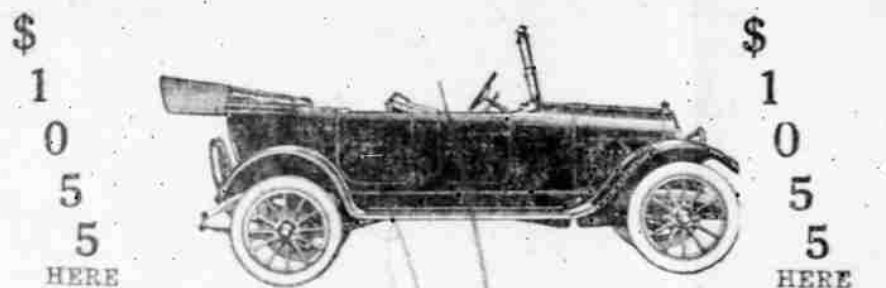
