applause greeted Mr. Chandler's speech.

Others numbers on the program which were enjoyed were a recitation, "The Unreasonable Pa.," by Orville Divins; a song and encore by L. J. Bennett, and an excellently rendered violin solo and encore by Prof. J. David Haynes. Mrs. W. Berry accompanied on the piano in these last two numbers.

Dr. Ira Aldrich, who was on the program for a toast, "Pals," was prevented by sickness from attending. The address of the evening was then given by Rev. S. Lapham, who spoke on the subject "Fathers and Sons." Three lusty cheers and a tiger for "dad" were sounded by scores of lusty, youthful throats, and three more and a tiger for mother, even more vigorous, came out when the speaker proposed them.

The dads, he said, complimented themselves on the fine, manly, upstanding, kindly fathers their boys had, and the boys congratulated themselves on the clean, straightforward and manly sons their fathers had. It was quite evident that all the dads and all the sons shared Mr. Lapham's opinion. He went on to speak at some length of the associations which should be formed and developed between all parents and their offspring, and showed how the spirit of comradeship in the home starts the boy on the straight road through life, and prevents delinquency and evil associations. He has seen this worked out, he said, in his long experience as a worker for the bettering of social conditions in the city of Portland. Fathers and sons all enjoyed Rev. Mr. Lapham's address.

During the program the chairman introduced the secretary of the "Y," J. L. Cramer, who spoke of the work the "Y. M. C. A." is anxious to do in helping the boys, and in this connection Mr. Cramer introduced the new physical director of the "Y," Melvin P. Boley, to those present. At the close of the evening, Chairman H. C. A. Boyd's work committee, announced that next Monday a conference of fathers and of all persons who are interested in the boy problem, would be held. He urged all to make an effort to attend, and carry on the work which the affair last evening was intended to promote.
