NEW PASTOR AT ISLAND CITY

SUCCESSOR TO REV. ROBERTS IS
EXPECTED THIS WEEK.

Former Chaplain of Idaho Penal Institution Coming to Neighboring Town.

It is announced to The Observer today by Dr. Ira Aldrich, district superintendent of the Methodist church, that he has appointed Rev. James Leitch of Boise to fill out the unexpired one-half year at Island City, the pastorate being vacant through the temporary retirement of Rev. A. W. Roberts, on account of illness.

Rev. Mr. Leitch has served with great credit for the past two years as state chaplain of the penal institutions in Boise, under Governor Alexander, and he is well and favorably known all over Idaho. He has held pastorates at American Falls, Filer and Kimberley, Ida.

Dr. Aldrich states that he has known Rev. Mr. Leitch personally for several years and that he has full confidence in his character and ability. The new pastor is a good leader of music, both vocal and instrumental, having directed choirs, orchestras and bands with equal credit. He will preach at both the morning and the evening services in the Island City church Sunday next.

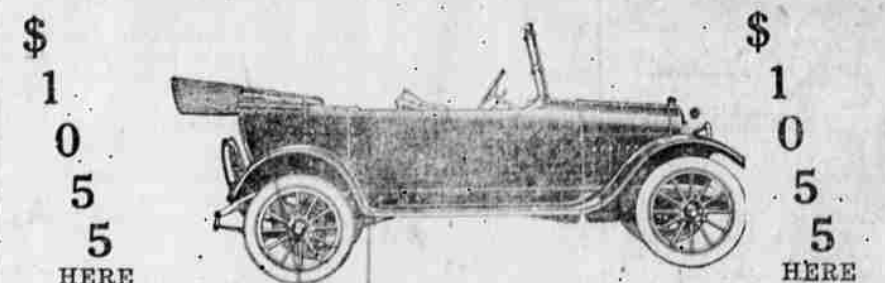
