WORD OF DEEP APPRECIATION

LETTER OF ACKNOWLEDGMENT BY NAVY OFFICER

Harry Pattison Loaned Binoculars Which Were Found to Be of Great Service on the Sea.

During a large part of last year Mr. W. R. Parker of this city had charge of soliciting the use of field glasses for the war. Among those who responded to this call was Harry Pattison, and the following letter of appreciation has been received by Mr. Pattison from Lieut. Commander Smith, of the U. S. S. Missouri:

My Dear Mr. Pattison:
Since last April I have been using a pair of binoculars, which you so kindly donated to the navy for use during the war. I am returning these today via official channels, which may cause some delay in reaching you, but it is the way I must send them. So I am writing to send my personal thanks for the use of the glasses, as they have been invaluable to me on the duty I have been doing throughout the war. I have been Flag Lieutenant to Rear Admiral Thomas Snowden, commander of the First Battleship fleet. As such it was very important for me to have a good pair of binoculars. Yours were perfect for my use. As I frequently wore them sixteen hours a day their light weight was a good point. Their power was sufficient for me to read flag signals up to six miles on a clear day and yet not so high that they would be dim on a misty day. I have taken good care of them and I trust they will reach you in satisfactory condition. They have been little excitement—mainly long hard sea work. Received one golden war service chevron while wearing them.
Thanking you again I am sincerely yours.
