Methodist Minute Men.

Another feature of this new movement in the church is the appointment of laymen in every local church to act as Methodist Minute Men.

These men will receive special instruction in world reconstruction and will be called upon to speak five minutes in every service.

Twenty thousand minute men have already been appointed throughout the nation. The following are the minute men for La Grande:

For Young Men and Women.

The centenary reconstruction program will require fifty-three thousand highly trained young men and women for full time Christian service.

These recruits will be obtained by a system of personal work and draft. They will be sought for in the colleges, universities, normal schools and high schools of the land. Three mil-

lions dollars have been set aside to establish six special training schools to prepare these leaders for the century work.

The opportunities for service in the church has never greater than now. The future opens a still greater field of usefulness and opportunities of leadership to talented young men and women.

The variety of work demanded by the church is constantly increasing. The field in the pastorate for regular ministers is wide open today. Churches are constantly demanding better men and are offering higher salaries than ever before in the history of the world.

The missionary fields are in crying need for more workers. These fields demand highly trained medical men and women, educational directors, teachers, deacons, social service workers, as well as general preachers.

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DAYTON HAS NIGHT TRAPSHOOTING CLUB

Lighting System Has Been Worked Out That Makes Shooting a Pleasure

Dayton, Ohio, is the home of the only trapshooting organization in the United States that conducts its shooting tournaments after nightfall.

Night trapshooting—like baseball at night—has been tried quite a number of times during the past few years, and in each place tried it was successful, but none of the organizations came back for more until the Dayton Club came into the limelight.

It isn't at all likely that sports fostered by artificial means will ever become popular, so that trapshooting and baseball at night will never keep the columns of the press filled with their doings.

The Dayton Club was put over by H. L. Monbeck, a booster for the sport during the days when the National Cash Register Company took an interest in the sport, and who is now connected with the DeLong Company. The lighting apparatus at Dayton was installed by G. H. Kressler, who appears to know his business.

Ten 450 candlepower incandescent lamps, 10 feet tall, were erected eight yards back of the score, and two 1000 candlepower lights were placed in position on the ground, one on either side of the trap-house. The cost of operation was 75 cents an hour. The place was as bright as day when the lights were in operation. It is the best lighting system ever used for trapshooting. Cincinnati sportsmen became so enthused that they are now figuring on inaugurating the sport in the Queen City.

An all-white target was used. It showed up fine. The regulation target was tried and could be seen very well, but the all-white target looked to be about one-third larger, which made it better for the purpose.
