SERVICE THAT IS TO BE USED

A GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT A BENEFIT
The Right Man for the Right Job is the Constant Aim for Mutual Benefit of All.

Employers must get the habit and must get it soon. Is the word sent out by the local superintendent of the United States Employment Service. They must get the habit of putting their applications for help through the local government office. Many men apply every day for work, but unless the employers let their wants be known it is impossible that these men be placed in positions. And further the employers are asked to give the office a short time in which to obtain the man they want. The motto of the U. S. Employment Service is "The right man for the right job at the right time," but, unless there is co-operation on the part of every one, this is impossible.

The service is free to all, the government establishing the office for the benefit of both employee and employer, and everyone is asked to use this service, whether wanting one or a dozen workers. The local superintendent will try to satisfy if such a thing is possible.

At present there are very few who really wish work that have not been placed in satisfactory positions, but, with the rapid return of overseas men, every possible opening for work must be known to the employment service in order that there shall be no delay in placing a single soldier or civilian worker.
