

## WOMEN ASKED TO SHARE BURDENS IN FIFTH LOAN

Mrs. Baldwin, Liberty Loan Chairman, Says Closer Cooperation With Men

Mrs. A. S. Baldwin, chairman of the Women's Liberty Loan Committee of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District, sends the following appeal to Western women to stand fast by the government in the Victory Liberty Loan:

Having responded ungrudgingly to the government's calls in the past, and victory having come to us because of this, shall we hesitate for a moment to respond to the last call—the Victory Liberty Loan, when we can do so by pledging our credit perhaps with some little personal inconvenience, sacrifice or small discomfort?

The credit and good faith of our country are now at stake. We have

said to those at the helm: "Go ahead. Win the war at any cost." We have won the war, and the cost is small compared with what has been won.

## WANTS NEW HOLIDAY

Suggestion That the Soldiers of the Soil Be Given Recognition

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—In honor of the Soldiers of the Soil a national holiday was advocated here today by Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the National war garden commission of Washington in an address before the School Garden Association of America, which is meeting in connection with the National Superintendents' convention.

"Is there anything more fitting," said Mr. Pack, "than to have a day set aside in the spring on which all of us shall get out of doors and into the sunshine for the first garden planting of the year? On the last Sunday in March we will have an extra hour of daylight which will mean millions of dollars in increased home food production. Think what it would mean if on the first Wednesday in April every year the millions of members of your school garden army marched out into the furrows of freedom in the war for food?"

"With us always is the war for food. With machine gun and hand grenade we have seen our heroes set up the frontiers of freedom. How are those frontiers to be maintained? Only by the furrows of freedom. In the garden we have the making of the better and healthier citizen—the creation of a longing for a bit of land for the individual—the creation of the desire for a home. With that spirit implanted in those who will come after us we will have set this nation upon a rock that none can shake—the great American home."

"A nation is no stronger than its agricultural wealth. We see proof of this in the glorious fighting of the polus who made good when they said 'they shall not pass.' The polus came from the land and it was for that land that he fought. We see proof of this again when the British Tommies answered that call of Marshal Haig who said: 'We stand with our backs to the wall.' We see proof of this again when our own marines went into Chateau Thierry and on into Belleau wood and but a handful returned. The marine was fighting for the place he called home. He was fighting to stop the bombing Zeppelins and the marauding wolves hidden in the sea. On the other hand, look at Russia. The answer to the present condition there is that the peasant knows nothing of land which he can call his home.

"The garden does other things, and one of the most important of these is that the garden paths lead directly to the bank windows and the Christmas Savings club. The gardener tends those paths every week. The banks know him for a good customer, and that means a good citizen, one who is not racing off after red flags and soap box oratory."

## GLAD TO RETURN TO PRISON

Escaped Convict Has Touch of Conscience and Gives Himself Up to Police

Des Moines, Ia.—Because his conscience would give him no peace, Arnold Jacobs, thirty-six, of Fort Worth, Tex., convicted murderer and escaped convict, gave himself up to the police here.

"I couldn't stand it any longer," said Jacobs. "Every man I passed I thought was looking for me. I spent most of my time dodging policemen." Jacobs declares he was convicted of murder and after serving ten years at Huntsville, Tex., made his escape last June.

## CALL WILL BE MADE

James K. Lynch, Governor Twelfth Federal Reserve District, Makes Announcement

James K. Lynch, governor federal reserve bank, Twelfth federal reserve district, says:

"Telegraphic reports of changes in the plan for financing the government have produced a feeling of uncertainty in the minds of our citizens.

"We have positive assurance from Secretary Glass that a popular loan will be offered for subscription on April 21st, and that this will be a 'saleable loan,' in other words, a loan that will be attractive to the investor whether in the form of certificates or bonds.

"Obviously, there are details which cannot yet be decided, and announcements which cannot be made until congress has legislated.

"Let us not be confused by preliminary discussion, but let us keep our minds fixed on the fact that our government requires the money to complete the work it has undertaken. The attempted industrial revolt which collapsed in Seattle owing to the firmness of the mayor, is evidence that Hun propaganda is still active. The 'war' will not be over until the Huns have been given the bill and have begun paying. Then, and then only, will they realize defeat and confess error."

## SCORN OLD JOBS

English Ex-Munitions Workers Spurn Domestic Employment.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—Thousands of women "ex-munitions" in England are having the time of their lives now. Although not drawing the high wages they did during the war, they are receiving \$7 a week out-of-work pay from the British government.

During the war some of these girls earned as much as \$45 a week, while all of them drew at least \$20. Losing all conception of the value of money they "blew" it on fine silks, fashionable dresses, visits to the theatre and the seaside. Before the war they worked as servants at \$2, with food and lodging.

Still retaining their millionaire tastes, but not the pay, the girls refuse to return to their old positions as housemaids, though offered twice the wage they received before. They prefer to draw the government \$7 a week subsidy.

The following incidents show the attitude of the girls.

Two girls dressed in the height of fashion were traveling together on a street car. Their conversation revealed them to be ex-munitions workers. They had a grievance, namely, that they had to go to a labor exchange each week to draw their employment allowance.

Three more girls, classified as servants before the war, visited a labor exchange to draw their allowance. One was immediately offered a position as a domestic servant, but she was indignant, and turning to her friend said: "Listen to that. Did you hear what he offered me? A job scrubbing floors. Not much. Try again."
